- Phillip won several prizes for landscapes he has created including the Chelsea Flower Show in 2013
- The chapters include different gardens he has designed with superb photographs and plans and text descriptions.
- He includes his home Olinda in the Dandenong Ranges Vic, inspired by Frank Lloyd Wright's house "Falling Water" cantilevered over a waterfall (you may have seen it Sunday night on Grand Designs program on the ABC). Phillip used runoff from the driveway and built an upper and lower billabong using gravity – a swimming pool – knowledge informed his Chelsea garden.
- Several gardens include a Meditation garden, produce garden, indigenous garden, fern garden, rock garden, and even an English garden. He works in both urban and rural environments using water and rock to create a lovely natural habitat.

- Those of us who attended the Friends lecture are familiar with the story of this book.
- In 1814 with the close of the Napoleonic Wars Joseph Banks persuaded the Prince Regent (later King George IV) to send collectors to the colonies of New South Wales to gather propagating material to rejuvenate and enlarge the King's Garden at Kew.
- En route they called into Rio de Janiero intending a short stay which extended for two years.
- Transcripts of official journals, correspondence with detailed interpretation is linked to their day to day comments and surviving plant specimens in the Natural History Museum, London and elsewhere.
- The book includes contemporary portraits, landscapes and plant paintings.
- A fascinating documentation of exploration and collection of plants.
