- Celia Rosser (b. 1930) is known to us as The Banksia Lady, but who else is Celia Rosser?
- Carolyn Landon was given complete access to Rosser's archive and offers of assistance from vast numbers of family, friends, and colleagues followed.
- The book explores the history of botanical illustration, botany, academia, gardens and herbaria.
- Alex George was seconded to Monash as part of the project and worked very closely with Rosser.
- The minutiae of people's lives usually don't interest me but I became fascinated by Rosser and the story of the Banksia project.

# The Southwest Australia's Biodiversity Hotspot

#### Victoria Laurie UWA Publishing (2015)

- As the title suggests, the Southwest is one of the world's top 30 biodiversity hotspots and is the only one in Australia.
- The Foreword suggests "Her research takes her into the laboratories and storeroom of museums, herbaria and universities: this is no superficial coffee-table volume but a serious review written with care and concern."
- Covers the seas, skies and the earth in the area between Kalbari and east of Esperance.
- Wonderful photography.

# Character of the Blossom Wildflowers of Tasmania by Margaret Hope (1848-1934)

#### Allport Library and Museum of Fine Arts (2015)

- Interesting to read the account of Margaret Hope's life just a few pages.
- It seems obvious that she intended to publish the folio of 37 paintings in this book.
- The plate notes include the botanical name at the time (then and now), the common name and a brief description. Interesting to see how many changes of name.
