

12. The last three plants are in pots on your right

Isopogon fletcheri is a small plant with leathery green leaves and cream starburst flowers (photo below left). This plant is found only in the Blue Mountains, NSW and is vulnerable to extinction.




13. *Grevillea saccata* has weeping branches with bright green upright leaves and pinkish orange flowers (photo above right). *Grevillea saccata* is commonly known as Pouched Grevillea, and is a shrub endemic to the south-west region of Western Australia.



14. *Grevillea shuttleworthiana* subsp. *canerina* has green foliage and cream rods of flowers (photo above). This plant is found in the wild on the coast between Perth and Geraldton in Western Australia.



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Today we will start at the bridge across to the café, skirt behind the café and walk up the Main Path.

1. Just before you cross the bridge on your right is *Xanthorrhoea glauca* subsp. *glauca*, a large grass tree with rippling grey-green linear foliage, just beginning to bloom, attracting much attention from birds and insects (photo top left next page). This plant is found in the wild in mostly coastal New South Wales and Queensland. Now bear left up the hill behind the café.

2. On your right is *Olearia argophylla*, a large bush with many heads of white daisies with gold centres (photo above). Also called Native Musk it is a tall shrub or small tree with felted grey leaves and white, strongly scented flowers. It is an east coast plant which grows naturally in NSW, Victoria and Tasmania.



3. On your left is ***Grevillea barklyana subsp. barklyana***, or Gully Grevillea, a large bush with pink toothbrush flowers (photo above right). It is found in New South Wales and Victoria.

4. ***Pomaderris helianthemifolia subsp. hispida*** or Blunt-leaf Pomaderris, on your right, is a medium-sized bush with dark green oblong foliage and pale yellow fluffy flowers (photo below). It occurs in Victoria and New South Wales, but is rare in the wild.



5. ***Daviesia arborea*** on your right is a small tree with drooping green shiny foliage and masses of yellow pea flowers (photo below). It is found in New South Wales and Queensland.



6. Turn left up the hill to see on your right ***Kunzea parvifolia***, a small bush with green foliage and mauve globular heads of flowers (photo below). It is found in the wild in Victoria and New South Wales.



7. Bear left up the path to see on your right ***Senna barronfieldii***, a sprawling shrub of divided green foliage and plenty of gold cup flowers (photo below). It is found in the wild along the east coast of mainland Australia. Turn back to the road.



8. Follow the Main Path, then turn left up a gravel path to see on your right ***Bauera rubioides*** or Dog Rose, in full bloom (photo below). *B. rubioides* is a large bush with bright pink flowers en masse and is widespread throughout coastal regions and moist mountain areas in NSW, Victoria and Tasmania.



9. Turn back to see on your left ***Calytrix tetragona prostrate***, a groundcover with many white balls of flowers beloved by bees (photo below). This plant is widespread in eastern and southern Australia, including Tasmania and Western Australia.



10. ***Telopea 'Canberry Gem'*** also on your left, forms a spectacular display of bright pink/red waratah flowers covering a large bush with dull green leathery foliage (photo below).



11. ***Isopogon anemonifolius***, or Broad-leaved Drumsticks, also on your left, is a medium bush of upright bright green foliage and yellow balls of flowers (photo below). It is found in the wild in eastern New South Wales.
