5.1	ANBG Executive Director	Judy West indicated that the transition into the Department was still underway and staff were busy with preparations for the Global Botanic Gardens Congress in Melbourne late September (26-29/9/2022). She also indicated that she was finalising her presentations for Thursday Talks and the Friends AGM on 20 October 2022.	Noted

5.6	Project Committee	Discussion focussed on the proposed Scholarship Program that had been considered by Council out of session and approved. Linda Beveridge asked Council to consider the following amendments to the original decision:  (a) The Friends ANBG Research Scholarship program continue in 2023-24 with funding of up to \$7,500 every year for 3 years ie a maximum of \$22,500 (c) The scholarship program continue, but review the situation in 2025-2026 with a view to making decision about the increase in the amount of funding to ensure that it retains economic value.  After much debate, the resolution was accepted with the proposed amendments, namely:  RESOLUTION: that Council agree:  (a) the Friends ANBG Research Scholarship program continue in 2023-24 with funding of up to \$7,500 every year for 3 years ie a maximum of 22,500 (b) that the scholarship can be used to undertake Honours, Masters or PhD level research  (c) the scholarship program continue, but review the situation in 2025-2026 with a view to making decision about the increase in the amount of funding to ensure that it retains economic value.  (d) that any underspend could be allocated to other projects except in circumstances where funding for an active scholarship needs to be rolled over to a subsequent year (as a consequence \$15,000 may need)	M: Linda Beveridge S: Anne Holmes	Passed

		(e) that the Project Committee will nominate a suitably qualified Friend to participate in the selection of scholarship recipients by ANBG.		
		Focus then turned on a late paper for funding the following honours project supported by Projects Committee:		
		Impacts of increased temperatures on Australian alpine Euphrasia's seed dormancy, germination and viability currently underway by Alex McLachlan who has worked in the National Seed Bank and is using Seed Bank resources. Two ANBG staff and two University of Canberra staff are supervising the research and \$4,000 is sought: (\$3,000 as a "top-up" to the scholarship and \$1,000 for research expenses).		
		Usually a Friend would be involved in any project that Council agrees to fund. However it is considered unnecessary in this case, as four people are supervising the Honours project.		
		RESOLUTION: That Council agree to provide \$4,000 this financial year for the Honours project "Impacts of increased temperatures on Australian alpine Euphrasia's seed dormancy, germination and viability" being undertaken by Alex McLachlan.	M: Wanda Filsell S: Linda Beveridge	Passed
5.7	Public Fund	Neville Page indicated that the Public Fund had agreed to help fund the Scholarship Program (see Agenda item 5.6 above). This decision was taken out of session and would see the Public Fund contribute \$7,500 pa.		Noted
		He then went on to say that Marg Nicholls and Adrienne Nicotra would be stepping down on 20 October 2022 and that he had accepted their resignations after thanking them for their contribution.  Neville then raised the issue of merging the Public Fund with Council. He explained that the Council is ultimately responsible and that only 3 members are required for the Management Committee under our Constitution. The		

		majority are also required to be responsible persons. Both he and Alan Henderson would qualify leaving Anne Holmes as the third member of this sub committee of Council. Other members of the Committee (Louise Maher and Jann Ollerenshaw) may be interested in joining Council. As yet neither have indicated whether they would be interested in joining Council.  There was then discussion about the independence of the Public Fund Management Committee and whether this was required under law. Neville Page indicated that he would investigate the matter further and come back with a proposal.
