The following information is drawn from various sources and is as accurate as possible. But sources often have differing information and it is sometimes hard to reconcile that information.






























		<i>Acacia cognata</i> Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Bower Wattle or River Wattle</i> Graceful weeping tree 4-6m with variable width. Creamy yellow ball flowers in spring. Protect from frost when young. Moist light to heavy soils. Fast growing small ornamental tree or screen.		
		<i>Alyogyne huegelii</i> 'West Coast Gem' Family: Malvaceae <i>Common name: Lilac Hibiscus</i> Rounded shrub 2-2.5m x 1-5-2.0m. Deep purple flowers late spring to late autumn. Needs cover from heavy frost. Well-drained soil. Prune from young age to promote a dense habit and strong root system. Grows rapidly; performs well in pots.	T	
		<i>Asterolasia hexapetala</i> Family: Rutaceae Erect shrub usually 1-2m high. White star flowers in spring. Woolly grey-green aromatic leaves. Prefers moist well-drained site with some shelter and some shade.	T	No
		<i>Banksia ericifolia</i> 'Red Clusters' Family: Proteaceae Bushy shrub 5m x 4m. Long red flower spikes in autumn and winter. Distinctive bright green foliage similar to that of the genus <i>Erica</i> . Suits most conditions. Good screening plant.		Unknown
		<i>Banksia spinulosa</i> var. <i>collina</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Hill Banksia</i> Rounded shrub 1.5m x 1.5m. Large golden flower spikes, or gold with purplish styles, over autumn-winter. Hardy in most aspects with well-drained soils. Resistant to salt spray and attracts birds. 		<i>Banksia spinulosa</i> 'Birthday Candles' Family: Proteaceae Cushion shaped groundcover 0.5-0.6m x 0.5-1.2m. Short orange spikes with reddish styles from autumn to early spring. Full sun results in better flowering. Likes well-drained soil. Ideal for rockery or container. Suits coastal areas as tolerates salt laden winds. Attracts wildlife.		Unknown
		<i>Boronia anemonifolia</i> subsp. <i>anemonifolia</i> Family: Rutaceae Graceful shrub to 1m x 1m. White flowers with 4 petals mainly in spring. <i>B. anemonifolia</i> prefers part sun with overhead cover, and cool root run. Needs good drainage. Good container plant.		Unknown
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> Family: Asteraceae Common name: Cut-leaf Daisy Dense perennial herb to 0.15m x 0.60m. White, pink or purple daisy flowers most of year but best in spring and summer. Prefers full sun, will tolerate some shade. Suits most well-drained soils. Prune old flowers for continuous display. Ideal for baskets, borders or mass plantings.		No
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Amethyst' Family: Asteraceae Bushy perennial 0.2-0.4m x 0.5-1.0m. Masses of lavender blue to purple flowers, mainly in spring and summer. Full sun and adequate moisture needed for maximum flowering. Good for pots, and hanging baskets.		No
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Breakoday' Family: Asteraceae Compact perennial herb 0.2-0.4m x 0.4-0.8m. Deep mauve daisy flowers with gold centres most of the year but best in spring and summer. Adequate moisture needed for maximum flowering. Suits baskets, rockery or pots.		No
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Roulette' Family: Asteraceae Prostrate bushy perennial herb 0.1-0.4m x 0.2-1m. Blue-mauve flowers with yellow centres most of the year, best in spring and summer. Spreads by branching and underground suckers.		Unknown
		<i>Callistemon pachyphyllus</i> 'Smoked Salmon' Family: Myrtaceae Erect shrub to 1.5m x 1.5 m. Salmon pink to shell pink flowers most of year with peaks in summer and autumn-early winter. Tolerates both moist and dry conditions; prefers sandy coastal soil. Prune annually behind spent flower spikes.	T	Unknown
		<i>Callistemon pallidus</i> 'Father Christmas' Family: Myrtaceae Dense rounded shrub 2-3m x 2-3m. White bottle-brush flowers with a red blush in spring. Grey-green tapered leaves. Will withstand moderate exposure to salt laden winds. Ideal for windbreaks, screening and hedging.	T	Unknown
		<i>Callistemon pallidus</i> 'Mt Oberon' Family: Myrtaceae Dense, rounded shrub 2-3m x 2-3m. Lemon-yellow bottle brush flowers in spring. Grey-green tapered leaves. Will withstand moderate exposure to salt laden winds. Ideal for windbreaks, screening and hedging.	T	Unknown
		<i>Callistemon sieberi</i> Family: Myrtaceae Common name: River Bottlebrush Usually pendulous shrub 2.5-3m x 2m, sometimes a small tree. Cream, pale yellow or pink flower spikes late spring to autumn. Prefers sunny position but copes with part shade. Tolerates most soils and conditions. Good for screen or hedge. 









		<i>Calytrix tetragona</i> Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Fringe Myrtle</i> Upright shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. White to deep pink star flowers in spring and summer. Fine bright green foliage. Well-drained soil. Prune regularly. Good feature plant and cut flower. Attracts bees and other insects.		Unknown
		<i>Chrysocephalum apiculatum</i> Family: Asteraceae <i>Common name: Yellow Buttons</i> Suckering perennial herb 0.15-0.4m x 0.5-2m. Clusters of small golden flowers during warmer months. Variable green or silver leaves. Most soils. Good for massed planting on banks. Prune at end of winter to encourage denser growth.		Unknown
		<i>Coprosma quadrifida</i> Family: Rubiaceae <i>Common name: Prickly Currant Bush</i> Slender erect shrub 2-5m x 1-2m. Tiny, greenish flowers from August then bright red fruit in summer. Needs moist soil. Tolerates salt and poor drainage. Fire-retardant plant; windbreak or screening plant. Food and habitat for fauna.		No
		<i>Correa alba (prostrate)</i> Family: Rutaceae <i>Common name: Native fuchsia</i> Low growing shrub to 0.3m x 1.2 m. White starry flowers in winter and most of the year. Prune to keep dense. Tolerates salt spray. Ideal for mass planting or in a pot. Attracts insects and birds.	T	
		<i>Correa decumbens</i> Family: Rutaceae <i>Common name: Spreading Correa</i> Groundcover 0.3-0.5m x 1.5-3m. Erect pinkish red bells with yellow-green tips mainly in summer. Moist or dry well-drained soils. Ideal for borders, covering banks or feature plant. Attracts birds.		
		<i>Correa glabra 'Coliban River'</i> Family: Rutaceae Dense shrub to 1.2 x 1.2m. Pale green flowers mainly in autumn and winter. Aromatic leaves. Most well-drained soils. Excellent low growing hedge, good in pots or as a feature plant. Attracts honey-eating birds.		
		<i>Correa reflexa 'Raelene Goldie'</i> Family: Rutaceae Dense shrub 1.2m x 3m. Bright red tubular flowers with yellow-green tips mainly July-October. Suits most positions including dry shade but flowers better in full sun. Ideal for mass planting or feature plant. Attracts nectar feeding birds.	T	
		<i>Correa 'Ivory Bells'</i> Family: Rutaceae Dense shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Profuse cream bells most of the year. Hardy particularly in moist, well-drained soil in a protected spot. Tolerates full sun but prefers dappled shade. Ideal for mass planting or feature plant. Attracts honey-eating birds.		Unknown
		<i>Crowea exalata</i> Family: Rutaceae Rounded shrub to 0.7m x 0.7m. Deep pink or white star flowers most of the year, particularly in autumn and spring. Well-drained mulched soil. Very decorative and good in pots. (White form may be less frost hardy so overhead cover desirable).		Unknown
		<i>Crowea 'Cooper's Hybrid'</i> Family: Rutaceae Dense upright shrub 1-1.5m x 1m. Deep pink star flowers mainly in autumn-winter. Glossy dark green leaves. Prefers filtered or part sun. Well-drained, mulched soil. Good feature plant or in mass plantings. Attracts insects.	T	Some situations

		Crowea 'Festival' Family: Rutaceae Compact dense shrub 1-1.2m x 1m. Bright pink star flowers in late summer-winter. Aromatic foliage. Grows well in most well-drained, mulched soil. Responds to pruning. Good feature plant or cut flower.		
		Epacris longiflora 'Nectar Pink' Family: Ericaceae Upright, straggly shrub 0.5-1m x 0.5-1m. Pink flowers with lighter tips, most of the year. Likes moist but well-drained, light to medium soils. Suitable for containers and rockeries. Bird attracting.		No
		Eremophila glabra subsp glabra Family: Scrophulariaceae <i>Common Emu Bush</i> Compact low shrub or erect form up to 2m x 2m. Red-orange flowers from March to December. Leaves almost silvery white. Open, sunny position with good drainage. Grows on a variety of soils. Tip pruning helps to keep the plant rejuvenated.	T	
		Eremophila glabra 'Kalbarri Carpet' Family: Scrophulariaceae Dense groundcover 0.1-0.2m x 1-2m. Profuse yellow tubular flowers mainly in spring and summer. Soft silvery-grey foliage. Well-drained soil, dislikes excess humidity. Tip prune to improve foliage density and flower production. Use in rockeries or large containers or plant over retaining walls or banks. Attracts wildlife.	T	
		Eremophila splendens Family: Scrophulariaceae Shrub 1-1.5m x 1m or more prostrate. Long tubular flowers, usually deep red, mainly in spring. Grey-green hairy leaves. Well drained soil. Ideal for containers. Attracts birds.	T	
		Eucryphia lucida 'Pink Cloud' Family: Cunoniaceae <i>Common name: Leatherwood</i> <i>E. lucida</i> usually grows 5-7 m in cultivation. Prefers a sheltered position from wind, ample moisture and well-drained soil. Prune to keep as a compact, bushy shrub. Copious nectar favoured by bees. Great tub plant or feature plant. In summer 'Pink Cloud' has soft pink flowers deepening to rose in the centre.	T	No
		Goodenia ovata Family: Goodeniaceae <i>Common names: Hop Goodenia</i> Shrub usually 1-1.5m x 0.6-1m. Large yellow flowers mainly in spring and summer. Leaves often shiny and sticky. Suits most soils but prefers some shade. Fast growing; responds to pruning. Ideal for mass planting or in pots. Attracts butterflies and other insects.		Unknown
		Grevillea lanigera (prostrate) Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Prostrate Woolly Grevillea</i> Groundcover 0.5m x 1-2m wide. Red and cream flowers in semi-erect clusters most of the year. Neat grey-green, "woolly" foliage. Most soils. Good container or rockery plant. Bird attracting.		No
		Grevillea monticola Family: Proteaceae Typically erect shrub to 1.6m x 1.5m but in harsh conditions may only reach 0.3m high. Clusters of creamy-yellow spider flowers winter-spring. Unusual holly shaped leaves. Well-drained soil; mulch well. Suitable for a pot or low hedging.	T	Unknown
		Grevillea rhyolitica 'Deua Flame' Family: Proteaceae Spreading shrub 1.5-2m x 1.5-2m. Showy red flowers most of the year. Prefers sun but will tolerate some shade. Adapted to low nutrient rocky soils. Ideal feature plant or screen. Attracts wildlife.		

		<i>Grevillea sericea subsp. sericea (pink form)</i> Family Proteaceae <i>Common name: Silky Grevillea</i> Upright shrub 1-2m x 1-1.5m, may spread by suckering. Prolific pink spider flowers mainly in winter and spring. Well-drained soil. Prune for compact shape. Very attractive to bees.	T	Unknown
		<i>Grevillea wilsonii</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Wilson's Grevillea</i> Variable shrub to 1m x 1-1.5m sometimes taller. Brilliant red flowers late winter-spring. Prickly, divided leaves. Well-drained soil. Bird attracting. Valuable habitat for nesting birds.		Unknown
		<i>Grevillea x gaudichaudii</i> Family: Proteaceae Dense groundcover usually 0.1-0.3m x 3m. Deep red toothbrush flowers spring-summer. Oak like leaves. Hardy in most situations. Ideal for cascading over an embankment or retaining wall. Fast growing and attracts birds.		
		<i>Grevillea 'Forest Rambler'</i> Family: Proteaceae Spreading shrub to 0.5m x 2m but may reach 1.5m x 3m. Pale pink and green flower clusters mainly in spring. Coppery new growth. Well-drained soils either clay or sand. Dense cover, prune to shape. Vigorous so useful for covering large areas. Bird attracting.		
		<i>Grevillea 'Poorinda Adorning'</i> Family: Proteaceae Low spreading shrub 0.5-1m x 2m. Bright red/pink woolly flowers from winter into summer. Pungent narrow leaves. Suits most well-drained soils. Ideal as feature plant, or mass planting. Attracts nectar feeding birds.	T	
		<i>Hakea 'Burrendong Beauty'</i> Family: Proteaceae Sprawling shrub to 1.5m x 1.5-3m. Showy bright pink and cream clusters of flowers-in winter-spring. Needs good drainage. Prune hard to create good shape. Good feature plant and bird attracting.		Some situations
		<i>Hibbertia pedunculata</i> Family: Dilleniaceae Groundcover to around 0.6m wide, tends to spread by self-layering. Profuse bright yellow flowers mainly late spring-summer. Dislikes drying out but also doesn't like wet soil. Hardy and good weed suppressant on banks etc.		No
		<i>Isopogon anemonifolius</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Broad-leaf Drumsticks</i> Usually upright shrub to 2m x 1-2m, sometimes almost prostrate. Showy soft yellow flowers in spring-summer. Attractive cones. Most well-drained soils. Water adequately for good growth and flowering. Good feature plant and cut flower.		No
		<i>Kunzea baxteri</i> Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Crimson Kunzea</i> Open spreading shrub 3m x 3m. Bright red bottlebrush-like flowers in spring and summer. Aromatic foliage. Most well-drained soils. Attracts parrots to flowers and fruit.	T	Unknown
		<i>Kunzea ericoides 'Snowman'</i> Family: Myrtaceae Compact shrub to 1m x 1m. Profuse lacy white flowers in spring and dark green, slender leaves. Tolerates a variety of well-drained soils. Ideal for cottage garden, rockery or in a container. Attracts birds, bees, insects and butterflies.		

		<i>Leptospermum rotundifolium</i> 'Julie Ann' Family: Myrtaceae Prostrate form to 0.3m x 1-1.5m. Masses of pale pink-mauve flowers in spring. Small round leaves. Naturally occurring form of <i>L. scoparium</i> var. <i>rotundifolium</i> . Most well-drained soils. Responds to pruning. Ideal for embankments and rockeries.		Unknown
		<i>Leptospermum</i> 'Aphrodite' Family: Myrtaceae Rounded or upright shrub, dense branching habit 2m x 2m. Profuse bright pink flowers in late spring. Lush green foliage. Most soils. Ideal as feature plant, for screening or trim as a hedge. Attracts birds, bees and other insects.		Unknown
		<i>Leptospermum</i> 'Copper Glow' Family: Myrtaceae Rounded shrub to 3m x 2m. Showy white flowers spring-summer which contrast with the bronze coloured foliage. Most aspects and soils are suitable. Good for screening. Attracts birds.	 To -4	Some situations
		<i>Leptospermum</i> 'Seclusion' Family: Myrtaceae Narrow shrub to 2.5m x 1-1.5m. Masses of bright pink, five-petalled flowers with green centres in summer. Dense green foliage. Suits a wide range of soils and positions. Ideal screening plant or formal hedge. Attracts nectar feeding insects.		Some situations
		<i>Lomatia tinctoria</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Guitar Plant</i> Variable shrub 1.5-2m high but often smaller and spreading by suckering. Cream or white flowers in summer. Open fruits resemble guitars. Dark green deeply divided leaves. New growth may be rusty in colour. Most well-drained soils.		 
		<i>Melaleuca nesophila</i> Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Showy Honey Myrtle</i> Dense shrub to 5m x 4m. Bright purple pompom-like flowers, fading several shades as they age, in spring-summer. Dense green foliage with aromatic leaves. Prefers well-drained soils but adapts to different conditions. Excellent screen plant.		Unknown
	 	<i>Micranthemum hexandrum</i> Family: Euphorbiaceae <i>Common name: Box Micranthemum</i> Erect shrub 1-3m x 1-2m. Profuse, scented creamy white flowers in late winter-spring. New growth bronze to reddish. Hardy in most soils and aspects including heavy shade. Prune for a neat hedge.		Unknown
		<i>Myoporum montanum</i> Family: Scrophulariaceae <i>Common name: Waterbush, Western Boobialla</i> Variable, shrub 3m x 3m or small tree to 8m. Fragrant white flowers, with purple spots, over winter to summer. Light purple to reddish-purple fruit. Well-drained soils. Fire retardant plant. Wind-break or screening plant.		 
		<i>Myoporum parvifolium</i> 'Purpurea' Family: Scrophulariaceae Dense groundcover 0.15-0.3m x 1-3m. Small white star flowers in spring-summer. Purple tinged foliage which deepens in winter. Prefers well-drained position. Low maintenance, fast growing. Ideal for banks and slopes.	T	Unknown
		<i>Pelargonium rodneyanum</i> Family: Geraniaceae <i>Common name: Magenta Storksbill</i> Perennial herb 0.3-0.4m x 0.3-0.5m. Dainty magenta flowers over spring and summer. Prefers well-drained slightly acidic soil. Benefits from a hard pruning and reduced water intake in winter. May self-seed. Good in pots, as a groundcover or in a rockery.		Some situations

		<i>Philotheca myoporoides</i> 'Profusion' Family: Rutaceae Compact, rounded shrub 0.8-1m x 0.8-1m. Pink buds opening to white starry flowers winter-spring. Dull green aromatic leaves. Well-drained soils. Ideal for cut flowers, shrubbery or in a pot.		Unknown
		<i>Philotheca myoporoides</i> 'Winter Rouge' Family: Rutaceae Bushy shrub 0.6-1m x 0.6-1m. Masses of pink buds opening to white stars flowers in late winter-spring. Aromatic foliage. Suits most well-drained soils. Responds to heavy pruning. Good in pots or as feature plant. Good cut flower.	T	Some
		<i>Podocarpus elatus</i> [Male and Female plants] Family: Podocarpaceae <i>Common names: Brown Pine, Plum Pine, Illawarra Pine</i> Large tree with spreading crown, usually 5-12m high in cultivation. Bluish-black edible fruits, plum-like, on female plants over autumn-winter. (Need a male and female plant for fruiting.) Most soils are suitable. Resistant to salt spray. Good for screening and shade.		Unknown
		<i>Podocarpus lawrencei</i> [Male plants] Family: Podocarpaceae <i>Common name: Mountain Plum Pine</i> Variable form, usually spreading shrub 1m x 2-3m.-Male cones are pink-purplish colour, in spring. Fruit on the female is a bright red, succulent berry-like structure, in summer. (Need a male and female plant for fruiting.) Likes full sun but also grows in fairly heavy shade. Ideal as groundcover or in pot.		No
		<i>Prostanthera incana</i> Family: Lamiaceae <i>Common name: Velvet Mint Bush</i> Erect or spreading shrub 1-1.5m x 1-1.5m. Profuse mauve flowers, occasionally white, in spring. Small woolly leaves with minty aroma when rubbed. Benefits from pruning. Ideal for rockeries or pots.		Unknown
		<i>Prostanthera rotundifolia</i> 'Rosea' Family: Lamiaceae Bushy shrub 1.5m x 1-1.5m. Profuse pale pink flowers in spring. Small dark green leaves with sweet minty aroma. Shelter from wind. Well-drained and mulched soil. Will tolerate dry soil once established. Attractive to bees and other insects.	T	Unknown
		<i>Prostanthera-violacea</i> Family: Lamiaceae <i>Common name: Violet Mint Bush</i> Slender branching shrub usually 1m x 1m. Dainty mauve-purple flowers in spring. Tiny aromatic woolly leaves. Well-drained soil and almost full sun. Mulch and prune. Suitable for containers.		Unknown
		<i>Prostanthera-walteri</i> Family: Lamiaceae <i>Common name: Blotchy Mint Bush</i> Sprawling shrub 1-2m x 1m. Unusual flowers: blue-green to pinkish-white, sometimes green-yellow, with purple veins in summer. Hairy tangled branches and leaves. Well-drained soil. Unusual feature plant.		No
		<i>Prostanthera</i> 'Poorinda Petite' Family: Lamiaceae Rounded shrub 1.2-2.4m x 1-2.2m. Profuse cup-shaped mauve flowers in spring-summer. Mid-green, aromatic leaves. Prefers protected site. Most well-drained soils. Attractive to bees and other insects.	T	Unknown
		<i>Pultenaea pedunculata</i> 'Burnt Orange' Family: Fabaceae Prostrate shrub around 20 cm high. Creeps to form dense mat 1-2m wide. Masses of orange and yellow pea-shaped flowers over spring to summer. Well drained soil. Ideal for rock garden or trailing over a retaining wall.	T	Some situations

		<i>Rhodanthe anthemoides</i> Family: Asteraceae Common name: Chamomile Sunray or Everlasting Daisy Dainty perennial to 0.3m x 0.6m. Rose-pink buds then white papery flowers with yellow centres over spring-summer. Mulch and prune after flowering. Good cut flower and ideal as border plant.		Unknown
		<i>Scaevola albida</i> Family: Goodeniaceae Common name: Pale Fan-flower Prostrate shrub 0.3m x 1m. Fan-shaped white, blue or mauve flowers most of the year. Hardy except in badly drained soils. Good as border or feature plant. Attracts bees.		Unknown
		<i>Spyridium scortechinii</i> Family: Rhamnaceae Common name: Cotton Bush, Pepper and Salt Rounded shrub to 70cm x 60cm. Bronze buds then masses of woolly white flowers in late winter-spring. Narrow, oval leaves. Well-drained soil. Long-lived plant with unusual flowers.		Unknown
		<i>Teucrium racemosum</i> Family: Lamiaceae Common name: Grey Germander Perennial herb to 0.4m high often suckering. White flowers late spring-summer with and silvery grey leaves. Needs site with good air movement and well-drained soil. Prune after winter. Good feature or accent plant in mixed plantings.		Some situations
		<i>Thryptomene sp</i> Family : Myrtaceae Low spreading shrub with arching habit 0.3-1m x 1m. Masses of small pink flowers over winter-spring. Tiny aromatic leaves. Well-drained mulched soil, preferably neutral to acid. Benefits from pruning after flowering. Good cut flower.	T	Some situations
		<i>Wahlenbergia gloriosa</i> Family: Campanulaceae Common Name: Royal Bluebell. ACT floral emblem Slender, suckering perennial herb 0.3m x 0.3m. Deep blue to purple flowers on long, slender stems summer-autumn. Small dark-green leaves with wavy edges. Needs light, enriched soil. Must be kept moist but well-drained. Grows well in water-well pots and hanging baskets.		No
		<i>Westringia 'Blue Heaven'</i> Family: Lamiaceae Dense, mound-shaped shrub 1.5-2m x 1-1.5m. Small mauve flowers in spring-summer. Soft blue-grey foliage. Most well-drained soils. Attracts native bees and butterflies. Can be hedged. Also suits coastal gardens.	T	
		<i>Westringia 'Morning Light'</i> Family: Lamiaceae Compact shrub to 1m x 1m. Small white flowers most of the year. Variegated green-grey leaves with cream band on edges. Suits most well-drained soils. Good accent plant for pots or screening.
