		<p><i>Acacia acinacea</i> 'Ruby Tips' Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Gold Dust Wattle</i> Spreading shrub to 1.2m x 1-2.5m. Golden ball flowers in spring. Ruby red new foliage. Prefers sunny situation. Most well-drained soils. Ornamental. Ideal for screening. Provides habitat and food for birds.</p>		Unknown
		<p><i>Acacia cognata</i> Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Bower Wattle or River Wattle</i> Graceful weeping tree 4-6m with variable width. Creamy yellow ball flowers in spring. Protect from frost when young. Moist light to heavy soils. Fast growing small ornamental tree or screen.</p>		
		<p><i>Acacia floribunda</i> [seed] Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Gossamer Wattle)</i> Graceful, dense tree 6-8m x 2m plus. Scented cream rods in early spring. Well-drained soils. Prune to hedge or screen. Fast growing. Grows well in coastal conditions.</p>		
		<p><i>Acacia pravissima</i> 'Kuranga Cascade' Family: Fabaceae Weeping or prostrate shrub 1m x3m. Triangular grey-green foliage and masses of golden ball flowers in spring. Fast growing. Ideal for cascading over an embankment or retaining wall.</p>		Unknown
		<p><i>Anigozanthus flavidus</i> (red-orange form) Family: Haemodoraceae <i>Common name: Tall Kangaroo Paw</i> Clumping plant with strappy dark green leaves to 1m x 1-2m.</p>		





























		Red-orange flowers on 2m long scapes late-spring-summer. Hardy in most positions and soils; tolerates damp conditions. Good rockery or container plant. Attracts birds.		
		<i>Babingtonia pluriflora</i> 'White Cascade' Family: Myrtaceae Spreading shrub to 0.5m x 1.5m. Clusters of small white flowers in autumn and summer. Attractive coppery new growth. Most soils. Prune after flowering. Good feature or screening plant. Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.		
		<i>Baeckea gunniana</i> Family: Myrtaceae Common name: Alpine Baeckea Variable shrub usually 0.3-1m x 0.3-1m but may reach 1.5-2m high. Masses of small white flowers in summer. Needs regular watering. Tolerates wet ground; leaves have pleasant tea tree smell when crushed. Local plant.		No
		<i>Baeckea linifolia</i> Family: Myrtaceae Common name: Weeping Baeckea Weeping shrub to 2.5m x 2m. Tiny white flowers most of the year; but particularly around summer. Adapts to most situations, more compact in full sun. Good in damp spots. Prune regularly for bushy shape. Good feature plant.		No
		<i>Banksia aemula</i> [seed] Family: Proteaceae Common name: Wallum Banksia Usually spreading shrub to 3m x 3m but may grow to 8m high. Yellow-green cones in late summer-autumn which remain for some time. Stiff serrated leaves. Best in sandy well-drained soil with access to moisture. Useful for screening; attracts birds.	T	Unknown
		<i>Banksia ericifolia</i> 'Little Eric' Family: Proteaceae Common name: Dwarf Heath Banksia Bushy shrub 1.5-2m x 1-1.5m. Large orange cylindrical spikes with maroon styles over autumn, winter and spring. Fine heather-like foliage. Tolerates a wide range of soils and conditions. Ideal for low hedging or screening. Attracts nectar feeding birds and insects.	T	
		<i>Banksia ericifolia</i> 'Red Clusters' Family: Proteaceae Bushy shrub 5m x 4m. Long red flower spikes in autumn and winter. Distinctive bright green foliage similar to that of the genus <i>Erica</i> . Suits most conditions. Good screening plant.		Unknown
		<i>Banksia</i> 'Giant Candles' Family: Proteaceae Rounded shrub 5m x 5m. Orange flower spikes in winter can reach 40cm. Full sun results in better flowering. Well-drained soil. Good feature and screening plant, bird attracting. Can be used for floral arrangements.		Unknown
		<i>Banksia marginata</i> 'Mini Marg' Family: Proteaceae Rounded shrub usually 1-2m x 1-2 m. Yellow flower spikes most of the year. Leaves dark green on top and silvery-grey underneath. Most well-drained soils. Ideal low hedge, in rockeries, containers or as feature plant. Attracts nectar feeding birds and insects; provides refuge for wildlife.	T	Some situations
		<i>Banksia oblongifolia</i> [seeds and cuttings] Family: Proteaceae Common name: Fern-leaved, Dwarf or Rusty Banksia Open, multi-stemmed shrub to 2m x 2m. Yellow-green flowers in autumn and winter. New leaves covered with rusty fur. Prefers well-drained soil. Needs pruning. May need extra water in dry weather; tolerant to salt spray. Bird attracting.		No
































		<i>Banksia serrata</i> 'Pygmy Possum' Family: Proteaceae Mound-shaped groundcover with arching branches 0.3-0.6m x 1-2.5m. Yellow/cream flowers over many months. Best in full sun but will tolerate some shade. Well-drained soil preferred. Suitable for coastal areas and bonsai.		Some situations
		<i>Banksia spinulosa</i> 'Birthday Candles' Family: Proteaceae Cushion shaped groundcover 0.5-0.6m x 0.5-1.2m. Short orange spikes with reddish styles from autumn to early spring. Full sun results in better flowering. Likes well-drained soil. Ideal for rockery or container. Suits coastal areas as tolerates salt laden winds. Attracts wildlife.		Unknown
		<i>Bauera rubioides</i> (white form) Family: Cunoniaceae <i>Common Name: Dog Rose or River Rose</i> Compact shrub to 1.5m x 1-2m in full sun, more scrambling in shade. Dainty white rose-like flowers most of the year, peaking in spring-summer. Needs moist soil; suits poorly drained areas. Ideal as an understory plant, feature plant or in a pot. Attracts bees and butterflies.		No
		<i>Boronia</i> 'Telopea Valley Star' Family: Rutaceae Erect shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Profuse deep pink star shaped flowers mainly in spring. Likes dappled shade with protection from hot winds and afternoon sun. Most well-drained soils. Prune after flowering. Ideal feature plant in garden or pot		Unknown
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> Family: Asteraceae <i>Common name: Cut-leaf Daisy</i> Dense perennial herb to 0.15m x 0.60m. White daisy flowers most of year but best in spring and summer. Prefers full sun, will tolerate some shade. Suits most well-drained soils. Prune old flowers for continuous display. Ideal for baskets, borders or mass plantings.		No
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Amethyst' Family: Asteraceae Bushy perennial 0.2-0.4m x 0.5-1.0m. Masses of lavender blue to purple flowers, mainly in spring and summer. Full sun and adequate moisture needed for maximum flowering. Good for pots, and hanging baskets.		No
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Breakoday' Family: Asteraceae Compact perennial herb 0.2-0.4m x 0.4-0.8m. Deep mauve daisy flowers with gold centres most of the year but best in spring and summer. Adequate moisture needed for maximum flowering. Suits baskets, rockery or pots.		No
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Roulette' Family: Asteraceae Prostrate bushy perennial herb 0.1-0.4m x 0.2-1m. Blue-mauve flowers with yellow centres most of the year, best in spring and summer. Spreads by branching and underground suckers.		Unknown
		<i>Brachyscome</i> 'Strawberry Mousse' Family: Asteraceae Groundcover 0.15m x 1m. Bright pink daisy flowers with gold centres, from spring through to autumn. Hardy in most soils with good drainage. Suitable for containers, hanging baskets, and rockeries.	T	Some situations
		<i>Callistemon pachyphyllus</i> 'Smoked Salmon' Family: Myrtaceae Erect shrub 0.5-1.5m x 0.5-1.5m. Salmon pink to shell pink flowers most of year with peaks in summer and autumn-early winter. Tolerates both moist and dry conditions; prefers sandy soil.	T	Some situations





























		Callistemon pallidus 'Candle Glow' Family: Myrtaceae Arching groundcover 0.5-1m x 2-3.5m. Perfumed lemon brushes between spring and autumn. Silver-grey foliage. Most well-drained soils. Ideal for erosion control. Responds to pruning so also suits courtyards and containers.	T	Unknown
		Callistemon subulatus 'Brogo Overflow' Family: Myrtaceae Shrub with weeping habit to 1.5m x 1.5m. Crimson red bottlebrushes from autumn onwards. Dark green leaves with reddish new growth. Most soils. Can withstand some waterlogging. Good for screening or low hedges. Attracts birds, bees and other insects.		
		Callistemon viminalis 'Little John' Family: Myrtaceae Rounded shrub 0.75-1m x 0.5-1m. Red bottlebrush flowers prolific in spring. Grey blue-green narrow dense soft foliage. Flowers best in full sun. Suits most soil types. Suitable for courtyards, pots and rockeries.		
		Chrysocephalum apiculatum Family: Asteraceae Common name: Yellow Buttons Suckering perennial herb 0.15-0.4m x 0.5-2m. Clusters of small golden flowers during warmer months. Variable green or silver leaves. Most soils. Good for massed planting on banks. Prune at end of winter to encourage denser growth. Local plant.		Unknown
		Correa alba (non prostrate) Family: Rutaceae Common name: Native Fuchsia, White Correa Rounded shrub 1-1.5m x 1-1.5m. White star flowers in winter and other months. Glaucous grey-green leaves. Flowers best in full sun. Most well drained soils. Resistant to salt spray. Good hedging plant. Useful in floral arrangements. Attracts birds.		
		Correa alba (prostrate) Family: Rutaceae Common name: Native Fuchsia, White Correa Low growing shrub to 0.3m x 1.2m. White starry flowers in winter and most of the year. Prune to keep dense. Tolerates salt spray. Ideal for mass planting or in a pot. Attracts insects and birds.		
		Correa baeuerlenii Family: Rutaceae Common Name: Chef's Hat Correa Rounded shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Green bell-shaped flowers, mainly in autumn and winter. Glossy, dark green leaves. Likes dappled sunlight to shade. Prefers moist, well-drained soils. Water during dry spells. Attracts birds and is a good contrast plant.		No
		Correa 'Cane's Hybrid' Family: Rutaceae Low spreading shrub 0.6-1m x 1m. Large pale pink/cream tubular flowers with pale green tips in winter. Hairy leaves. Suits most soils with reasonable drainage. Protect root zone from hot sun. Good for small gardens and pots.		Unknown
		Correa 'Dusky Bells' Family: Rutaceae Compact shrub 0.6-1m x 2m. Long dusky pink bell flowers in autumn and winter. Tolerates full sun but prefers some shade. Best in moist but well-drained soil. Long lived and attracts birds.		No
		Correa glabra var. glabra Family: Rutaceae Rounded or erect shrub 2-3m x 1-3m. Pale yellow-green tubular flowers mainly autumn-winter. Little information about this variety but it is likely to have similar growing needs to Correa glabra. Can be used for screening. Attract birds.		Unknown
		Correa 'Ivory Bells' Family: Rutaceae Dense shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Profuse cream bells most of the year. Hardy particularly in moist, well-drained soil in a protected spot.		Unknown


























		Tolerates full sun but prefers dappled shade. Ideal for mass planting or feature plant. Attracts honey-eating birds.		
		Correa 'Marian's Marvel' Family: Rutaceae Open hardy shrub 1-2m x 3m. Flowers pale pink upper, lime green tips in autumn and winter. Requires extra water in extended dry periods. Suitable as a hedge or container plant. Bird attracting.		No
		Correa 'Pink Sensation' Family: Rutaceae Bushy shrub to 1m x 1m. Masses of pink star-shaped flowers autumn-winter. Suits most well-drained soils. Ideal for small gardens, shrub beds or large pots. Magnet for nectar feeding birds. [Also known as <i>Correa</i> 'Pinksensation']	T	Unknown
		Crowea exalata Family: Rutaceae Rounded shrub 0.7m x 0.7m. Profuse waxy pink star flowers most of the year, particularly in autumn and spring. Well-drained mulched soil. Benefits from pruning. Supplement water in dry periods. Very decorative; good in pots or rockeries. Local plant.		No
		Crowea exalata subsp exalata Family: Rutaceae Rounded shrub to 1.0m x 0.7m. Showy pink to mauve star flowers most of the year. Well-drained mulched soil. Decorative and good in pots. Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.		Unknown
		Crowea 'Little Rockstar' Family: Rutaceae Rounded compact shrub 0.8m x 0.8m. Prolific pink star flowers during autumn-winter and bright green leaves. Prefers well drained soils and extra water during dry summers. Suits smaller gardens and pots. Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.		No
		Crowea 'Pink Blush' Family: Rutaceae Small shrub to 1m x 1.2m. Pink buds open to white stars which age to pale pink from November to June. Most well-drained soils. Needs watering in summer. Ideal for rockery or feature plant.	T	No
		Cymbopogon refractus [seed] Family: Poaceae Common name: Barbed Wire Grass Tufted perennial grass to 0.4 m high with flower spikes 1-1.5m. Green flowers with red-brown markings from spring to autumn. Seedheads resemble barb wire when mature. Crushed foliage has lemony scent. Good for dry sites or low nutrient soils. Local plant.		
		Epacris longiflora 'Nectar Pink' Family: Ericaceae Upright, straggly shrub 0.5-1m x 0.5-1m. Pink flowers with lighter tips, most of the year. Likes moist but well-drained, light to medium soils. Suitable for containers and rockeries. Bird attracting.		No
		Eremophila nivea 'Gubburra Bells' Family: Scrophulariaceae Shrub 1-1.5m x 1-1.2m. Profuse lilac-purple tubular flowers over winter-spring. Contrasting silvery foliage and stems. Well-drained, loamy soil. Prune to encourage compact habit. Good feature plant. Attracts nectar feeding insects and birds.	T	Unknown
		Goodenia ovata Family: Goodeniaceae <i>Common names: Hop Goodenia</i> Shrub usually 1-1.5m x 0.6-1m. Large yellow flowers mainly in spring and summer. Leaves often shiny and sticky. Suits most soils but prefers some shade. Fast growing; responds to pruning. Ideal for mass planting or in pots. Attracts butterflies and other insects.		Unknown



























		<i>Grevillea diminuta</i> Family: Proteaceae Common name: <i>Brindabella Grevillea</i> Spreading shrub to 1m x 1-3m. Striking pendulous clusters of rusty-red flowers outside and bright pink inside usually in spring. Most well-drained soils. Tolerates shaded position. Very hardy. Considered rare. Suits rockery. Attracts birds. Local plant.		Some situations
		<i>Grevillea lanigera (prostrate)</i> Family: Proteaceae Common name: <i>Prostrate Woolly Grevillea</i> Groundcover 0.5m x 1-2m wide. Red and cream flowers in semi-erect clusters most of the year. Neat grey-green, "woolly" foliage. Most soils. Good container or rockery plant. Bird attracting.		No
		<i>Grevillea manglesii subsp. ornithopoda</i> Family: Proteaceae Common name: <i>Birdsfoot Grevillea</i> Spreading shrub usually 1-3m x 3m. Clusters of feathery white flowers in spring. Unusual leaves resemble a bird's foot. Well-drained soil; mulch well. Prune to maintain shape. Ideal for hedging or screening.		Unknown
		<i>Grevillea 'Mason's Hybrid'</i> Family: Proteaceae Bushy shrub 1.5-2m x 2-3m. Attractive apricot-red flowers with divided leaves, long flowering. Well-drained soil. Good low hedge or screen and feature plant. [Also known as <i>Grevillea 'Ned Kelly'</i>]	T	
		<i>Grevillea 'Poorinda Adorning'</i> Family: Proteaceae Low spreading shrub 0.5-1m x 2m. Bright red/pink woolly flowers from winter into summer. Pungent narrow leaves. Suits most well-drained soils. Ideal as feature plant, or mass planting. Attracts nectar feeding birds.	T	
		<i>Grevillea 'Red Wings'</i> Family: Proteaceae Spreading shrub 0.3-1m x 1-2m. Bright red, spidery flowers late winter-spring. Tiny, fine ferny leaves. Suited to most well-drained soils. Good cut flower. Attracts bees, butterflies and birds		
		<i>Grevillea rhyolitica 'Deua Flame'</i> Family: Proteaceae Spreading shrub 1.5-2m x 1.5-2m. Showy red flowers most of the year. Prefers sun but will tolerate some shade. Adapted to low nutrient rocky soils. Ideal feature plant or screen. Attracts wildlife.		
		<i>Grevillea 'Scarlet King'</i> Family: Proteaceae Shrub 1-2m x 0.6-1m. Scarlet toothbrush flowers most of the year. Flowers best in full sun but will take a little shade. Prefers open position with good air flow. Attracts birds and bees.	T	
		<i>Grevillea x gaudichaudii</i> Family: Proteaceae Dense groundcover usually 0.1-0.3m x 3m. Deep red toothbrush flowers spring-summer. Oak like leaves. Hardy in most situations. Ideal for cascading over an embankment or retaining wall. Fast growing and attracts birds.		
		<i>Guichenotia ledifolia</i> Family: Malvaceae Spreading shrub 0.4-1.5m x 1-1.5m. Dainty mauve-pink flowers appear in sprays over midwinter and spring. Well-drained soil. Prune after flowering to create dense habit. Feature plant or low screen. Attracts bees and other insects.	T	Some situations
		<i>Hakea bakeriana [seed]</i> Family: Proteaceae Compact shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Pale pink to crimson flowers in large clusters winter-spring. Large attractive woody fruits. Best in open sunny site. Likes sandy well drained soils but tolerates heavier soils. Provides shelter and nectar for birds.		Unknown

























		<i>Hakea francisiana</i> [seed] Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Pink Spike Hakea, Bottlebrush Hakea, Emu Tree</i> Erect shrub usually 3-4m x 2m. Showy pinkish- red flowers spikes winter-spring. Most well-drained soils. Best in open sunny position but will tolerate some shade. Ideal for screening or windbreak. Attracts birds, bees and other insects.		
		<i>Hakea nitida</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common Name: Frog Hakea or Shining Hakea</i> Bushy shrub 1-3 m x 2-3m. Profuse creamy white fragrant flowers in winter-spring. Glossy green prickly leaves. Seed capsules resemble squatting frogs about to jump. Most well-drained soils. Ornamental and good habitat plant for wildlife.	T	Some situations
		<i>Hakea petiolaris subsp trichophylla</i> [seed] Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Sea urchin Hakea</i> Shrub or small tree 3-9m high. Globular shaped cream flowers in autumn-winter which darken to mauve and then maroon. Best in open sunny position. Well drained soil, preferably acidic. Good feature plant. Attracts honey eating birds.		Unknown
		<i>Hakea scoparia subsp scoparia</i> Family: Proteaceae Rounded shrub 1-3.5m high. Globular shaped cream flowers in autumn-spring which age to pink or orange-pink. Silvery-green needle like foliage. Well drained soil. Ideal for informal hedge, windbreak or screen. Attracts honey eating birds.		
Climber		<i>Hardenbergia comptoniana</i> Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Native Wisteria</i> Twining climber to 3m. Clusters of purple-blue pea flowers in winter-spring. Glossy dark green leaves. Most well-drained soils. Ideal for covering banks, trellis or fences. Fast growing. Attracts butterflies.	T	Unknown
		<i>Hibbertia empetrifolia</i> Family: Dilleniaceae <i>Common name: Trailing Guinea Flower</i> Groundcover 0.3- 0.6m x 1.5m. Bright yellow flowers in spring which contrast with the shiny dark green leaves. Prefers moist situation. Mass plant or use in hanging basket.	T	No
		<i>Hibbertia pedunculata</i> Family: Dilleniaceae Groundcover to around 0.6m wide, tends to spread by self-layering. Profuse bright yellow flowers mainly late spring-summer. Dislikes drying out but also doesn't like wet soil. Hardy and good weed suppressant on banks etc.		No
		<i>Howittia trilocularis</i> Family: Malvaceae <i>Common name: Blue Howittia</i> Erect shrub to 1.5-3m x 1.5-2.5m. Hibiscus-like lavender, violet or mauve flowers late spring-summer. Best in moist shady spots with good drainage, otherwise flowers less and becomes sparse. Attracts butterflies and moths.		No
		<i>Isopogon anemonifolius</i> [seed] Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Broad-leaf Drumsticks</i> Usually upright shrub to 2m x 1-2m, sometimes almost prostrate. Showy soft yellow flowers in spring-summer. Attractive cones. Most well-drained soils. Water adequately for good growth and flowering. Good feature plant and cut flower.		No
		<i>Kunzea ambigua</i> Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: White Kunzea or Poverty Bush</i> Variable shrub 1.5-3m x 2-3m. Perfumed fluffy white balls in late spring and summer. Good as background shrub, for screening or as a feature. Attracts beetles when flowering and then birds.		Unknown

		<i>Lasiopetalum behrii</i> Family: Sterculiaceae <i>Common name: Pink Velvet Bush</i> Erect shrub 0.3-1.5m x 1m. Pink or white flowers, greenish inside, in late winter-spring. Likes relatively dry soil. Suits low maintenance areas. Critically endangered in NSW.		
		<i>Leptospermum 'Aphrodite'</i> Family: Myrtaceae Rounded or upright shrub, dense branching habit 2m x 2m. Profuse bright pink flowers in late spring. Lush green foliage. Most soils. Ideal as feature plant, for screening or trim as a hedge. Attracts birds, bees and other insects.		Unknown
		<i>Leptospermum 'Copper Crest'</i> Family: Myrtaceae Rounded shrub 4m x 4m. Profuse white flowers over summer and bronze-green aromatic foliage. Suits most soils. Good for screening and suitable for hedging. Attracts birds.		Unknown
		<i>Leptospermum deuense</i> Family: Myrtaceae Dense shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Beautifully formed white flowers mainly in summer, then furry seed capsules. Elliptical leaves aromatic when rubbed. Most well drained soils. Prune to shape. Good feature plant.		Unknown
		<i>Leptospermum 'Love Affair'</i> Family: Myrtaceae Spreading shrub to 1.5m x 1.5m. Abundant soft pink flowers in spring. Suits most soils, Trim after flowering. Ideal for small gardens or containers. Attracts a variety of birds and insects	T	Unknown
		<i>Leptospermum 'Pageant'</i> Family: Myrtaceae Shrub 1-1.5m x 1.5-2m with cascading habit. Masses of purple flowers in spring. Prefers a sunny spot but will tolerate some shade Most soils. Good feature plant in small gardens or large pots. Attracts nectar feeding insects.		Unknown
		<i>Leptospermum petersonii</i> Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Lemon-scented Tea-tree</i> Rounded shrub 4-5 m x 3-4 m. Small white flowers in spring and summer. Soft green foliage. New leaves have a reddish tinge. Suits most positions but will have a more open habit in part shade. Most well-drained soils. Good for screening and attracts birds.	T	Some situations
		<i>Leptospermum 'Pink Cascade'</i> Family: Myrtaceae Dense shrub with arching branches spreading-0.5-1m x 1-1.5m. Flowers pink, fading to white, mainly in spring and autumn. Leaves dark green, new growth red. Suitable for a range of soil conditions. Grows well over walls, or in rockeries.		Some situations
