

12. Still on your right is *Banksia integrifolia* *subsp. compar* or Coast Banksia, a small tree with long yellow cones and dark green leaves with silver backs (photo below left). This tree is native to the east coast of Queensland.



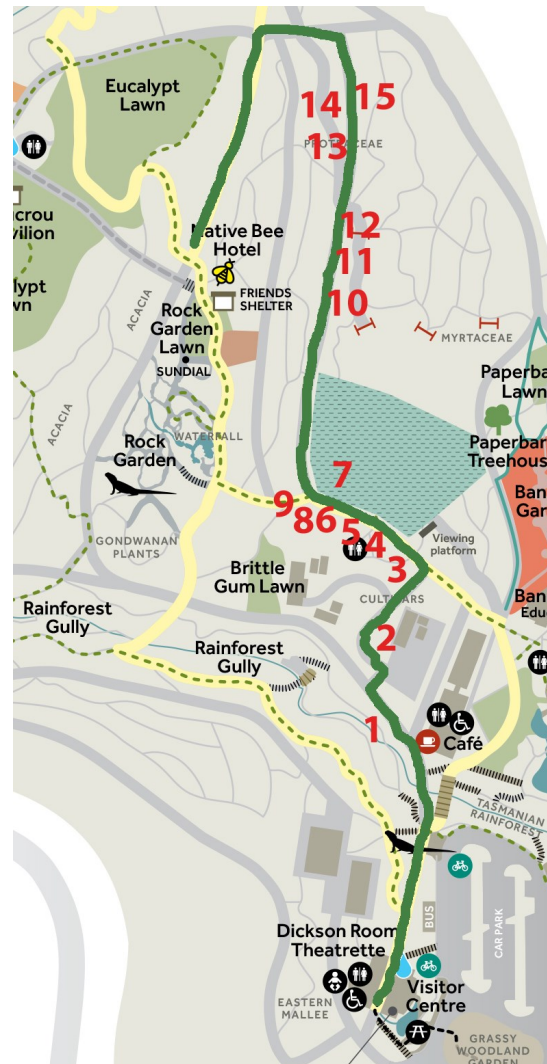
13. On your left is *Banksia neoanglica*, or New England Banksia, with silver-backed, dark green foliage with gold flowers held upright (photo above right). This shrub is native to the eastern tablelands of Queensland and New South Wales.

14. Also on your left is *Grevillea jephcottii*, or Green Grevillea, a rounded plant with small leaves and green flowers in clusters over a long period (photo below left). These plants are native to a few areas near the Burrowa-Pine Mountains region of northeastern Victoria.



15. On your right is *Grevillea* 'Sid Reynolds' which arose as a seedling in the garden of Sid Reynolds and is thought to be a hybrid between *G. pinaster* and *G. commutata* (photo above right). This shrub has fine green foliage and red and yellow spider flowers.

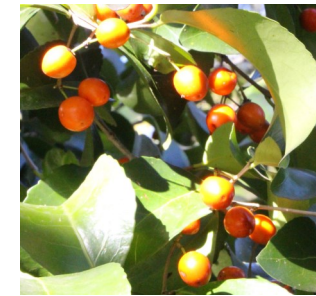
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Today we will walk from the Visitor Centre, up the hill behind the café, along the road behind the depot, then uphill to the road above the new Conservatory



1. After you leave the Visitor Centre bear left up the hill behind the café to see, on your left, *Elaeodendron australe* *var. australe*, or Red Olive Berry, a small tree with reddish-orange fruits and shiny green leaves, which is native to the coast from Moruya in southern New South Wales to the central coast of Queensland (photo above).

2. Turn right along the road behind the depot, to see on your right, *Banksia spinulosa*, a bush with large pale-yellow flowers held upright on toothed linear grey-green foliage (photo next page top left). Sometimes known as the Hairpin Banksia, this plant is native to the three eastern states extending along the coast from Victoria to Cairns.





3. Turn left uphill to see, on your left, **Grevillea 'Legacy Flame'**, a small grevillea, bred locally by Bywong Nursery, which commemorates 100 years of Legacy Australia with flame-like orange-red flowers which resemble the Legacy torch (photo above right).



4. Also on your left is **Correa 'Lemon Twist'**, a hybrid between *C. reflexa* var. *nummularia* and *C. alba* which occurred in the gardens of Native Plant Wholesalers in Mount Gambier (photo above). 'Lemon Twist' is a small, spreading shrub with attractive shiny foliage and well displayed lemon flowers.



5. Still on your left is **Crowea 'Little Rockstar'**, a compact form of Crowea from a seedling variant growing at the ANBG (photo above). This plant is covered in pink star flowers.

6. Again on your left is **Grevillea 'Bloodline'**, recently bred at Bywong Nursery by Peter Ollerenshaw, similar to the long flowering variety Grevillea 'Lady O', but with a slightly arching habit (photo below left).



7. On your right is **Brachychiton rupestris**, or Queensland Bottle Tree, a small tree with a trunk swollen with water, endemic to central Queensland and northern New South Wales (photo above right).



8. On your left is **Grevillea 'Metal Red'**, a hardy shrub with metallic-red flowers held above soft, divided green foliage, a hybrid between *G. banksii* 'prostrate' x *G.* 'Bronze Rambler' (photo above).

9. Again on your left is **Phebalium woombye pink**, a bushy shrub with slender leaves, silver on the reverse, and clusters of starry, pink flowers, native to southeastern Queensland and northeastern NSW coastal regions (photo below left).



10. Turn right along the road above the Conservatory to see, on your right, **Isopogon cuneatus**, an upright shrub with floppy branches of flat bright green leaves, often tinged with red, and large pink heads of drumstick flowers (photo above right). This plant is native to southwestern Western Australia.



11. Also on your right is **Grevillea rhyolitica subsp. rhyolitica**, or Deua Grevillea, a spreading shrub with coral red spider flowers endemic to the south coast of New South Wales near Moruya (photo above).
