		<b><i>Acacia cognata</i></b> <i>Common name: Bower Wattle or River Wattle</i> Graceful weeping tree 4-6m with variable width. Creamy yellow ball flowers in spring. Protect from frost when young. Moist light to heavy soils. Fast growing small ornamental tree or screen.		
		<b><i>Austromyrtus dulcis</i></b> <i>Common name: Midgen Berry</i> Shrub usually 0.3-0.6m x 0.8-1m. Profuse fluffy white flowers in summer. Sweet edible whitish berries with small blue-black spots in summer-mid autumn. Copper coloured young leaves. Most soils. Needs regular watering. Attractive in the garden or a pot.	T	No
		<b><i>Babingtonia pluriflora</i> 'White Cascade'</b> <b>Family: Myrtaceae</b> Spreading shrub to 0.5m x 1.5m. Clusters of small white flowers in autumn and summer. Attractive coppery new growth. Most soils. Prune after flowering. Good feature or screening plant. Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.		
		<b><i>Babingtonia similis</i> "Howie's Feathertips"</b> <b>Family: Myrtaceae</b> Weeping shrub up to 0.5m x 1.0m. Small clusters of brilliant white flowers in spring-summer. Adaptable plant but grows best in moist, well-drained sunny spot. Ideal for growing over rock walls or ledges. Attracts birds and insects. Also called <i>Baeckea</i> or <i>Sannantha</i> 'Howie's Feathertips'.	T	Unknown

































		<b><i>Baeckea linifolia</i></b> <b>Family: Myrtaceae</b> <i>Common name: Weeping Baeckea</i> Weeping shrub to 2.5m x 2m. Tiny white flowers most of the year; but particularly around summer. Adapts to most situations, more compact in full sun. Good in damp spots. Prune regularly for bushy shape. Good feature plant.		No
		<b><i>Banksia ericifolia</i> 'Red Clusters'</b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Bushy shrub 5m x 4m. Long red flower spikes in autumn and winter. Distinctive bright green foliage similar to the genus <i>Erica</i> . Most soils but prefers well drained ones. Good screening plant.		Unknown
		<b><i>Banksia integrifolia</i> subsp <i>integrifolia</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> <i>Common name: Coast Banksia</i> Groundcover to 1m x 2m. Pale yellow flower spikes summer to winter. Dull green leaves with silvery undersides. Prefers sandy, well drained soil. Ideal cascading over walls or for erosion control. Attracts birds, bees and other insects.		Moderate
		<b><i>Banksia marginata</i> 'Coles Bay'</b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Spreading shrub to 2m x 2m. Small yellow flower spikes in autumn. Well-drained soil. Good for small gardens. Attracts birds and insects.		Unknown
 or more		<b><i>Banksia neoanglica</i> [seed]</b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> <i>Common name: New England Banksia</i> Multi-stemmed shrub usually 2.5-3m high. Some forms grow to 7m. Orange to yellow-orange flower spikes mainly autumn-winter. Well-drained sandy to loam soil. Slow growing. Suitable for hedging or screening. Attracts nectar feeding birds.		Unknown
		<b><i>Banksia oblongifolia</i> [seed]</b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> <i>Common name: Fern-leaved, Dwarf or Rusty Banksia</i> Open, multi-stemmed shrub to 2m x 2m. Yellow-green flowers in autumn and winter. New leaves covered with rusty fur. Prefers well-drained soil. Needs pruning. May need extra water in dry weather; tolerant to salt spray. Bird attracting.		No
		<b><i>Banksia penicillata</i> [seed and cuttings]</b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Shrub 3-4m x 3m. Pale yellow flowers spikes March-June. Flower buds are very variable in colour. Deep green elliptical leaves, silver underneath. New growth is an attractive reddish brown. Well drained soil. Good screening plant. Attracts nectar eating birds.		Unknown
		<b><i>Bauera rubioides</i></b> <b>Family: Cunoniaceae</b> <i>Common name: River Rose, Dog Rose</i> Scrambling shrub 1-1.5m x 1-2m. Small cup shaped pink or white flowers most of the year. Needs moist well-drained soil. Mulch well. Good understory plant, as low hedge or in pots. Attracts bees and butterflies.		No
		<b><i>Boronia megastigma</i> 'Lutea'</b> <b>Family: Rutaceae</b> Shrub 0.6-1m x 0.6-1m. Masses of sweetly scented lemon bells in late winter-early spring. Prefers partly shaded position with moist, well-drained soil. Mulch to keep the roots cool. Suitable for pots and small hedges. Brings colour and perfume into your garden.	T	No
		<b><i>Bossiaea walkeri</i></b> <b>Family: Fabaceae</b> <i>Common name: Cactus Pea or Walker's Stick Bush</i> Rounded shrub 2m x 2m. Pinkish red pea flowers spring to autumn. Flattened leafless branches. Mulch well but keep reasonably dry. Unusual feature plant. Distinctive tasting honey.		
		<b><i>Brachyscome multifida</i> (white form)</b> <b>Family: Asteraceae</b> <i>Common name: Cut-leaf Daisy</i>		No



























		Dense perennial herb to 0.15m x 0.60m. White daisy flowers most of year but best in spring and summer. Prefers full sun, will tolerate some shade. Most well-drained soils. Prune old flowers for continuous display. Ideal for baskets or mass plantings.		
		<b><i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Amethyst'</b> Family: Asteraceae Bushy perennial 0.2-0.4m x 0.5-1.0m. Masses of lavender blue to purple flowers, mainly in spring and summer. Full sun and adequate moisture needed for maximum flowering. Good for rockery, pots, and hanging baskets.		No
		<b><i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Breakoday'</b> Family: Asteraceae Compact perennial herb 0.2-0.4m x 0.4-0.8m. Deep mauve daisy flowers with gold centres most of the year but best in spring and summer. Adequate moisture needed for maximum flowering. Suits baskets, rockery or pots.		No
		<b><i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Roulette'</b> Family: Asteraceae Prostrate bushy perennial herb 0.1-0.4m x 0.2-1m. Blue-mauve flowers with yellow centres most of the year, best in spring and summer. Spreads by branching and underground suckers.		Unknown
		<b><i>Brachyscome</i> 'Strawberry Mousse'</b> Family: Asteraceae Groundcover 0.15m x 1m. Bright pink daisy flowers with gold centres, from spring through to autumn. Hardy in most soils with good drainage. Suits containers, hanging baskets, and rockeries.	T	
		<b><i>Callistemon</i> 'Booti Booti Queen'</b> Family: Myrtaceae Rounded shrub to 1.5m x 1.5-2m. Large dark red flowers mainly in spring-summer. Most soils including poorly drained soils. Good feature plant. Attracts birds.	T	Unknown
		<b><i>Callistemon citrinus</i> 'Bronwen'</b> Family: Myrtaceae Upright shrub 1.5-2m x 1-2m. Showy bright pink-lilac brushes in late spring-summer. Most well drained soils. Prune after flowering to encourage dense growth. Fast growing. Ideal for screening or hedging. Attracts nectar feeding birds and insects.	T	
		<b><i>Callistemon citrinus</i> 'Splendens'</b> Family: Myrtaceae Rounded shrub 2-3m x 2-3m. Prolific large brilliant red flowers peaking in spring-summer. Most soils including poorly drained ones. Prune after flowering to keep dense. Suitable for hedging or screening. Tolerates salt spray. Attracts insects and birds. [Also known as <i>Callistemon</i> 'Endeavour']		Unknown
		<b><i>Callistemon</i> 'Dawson River Weeper'</b> Family: Myrtaceae Rounded or spreading shrub 4-6m x 3-5m with weeping habit. Bright red brushes mainly during spring-autumn. Adapts to most soils, including poorly drained sites. Needs ample water in dry periods. Good for hedging or screening, or as feature tree. Attracts nectar feeding birds and insects.		No
		<b><i>Callistemon montanus</i></b> Family: Myrtaceae Common name: <i>Mountain Bottlebrush</i> Erect or spreading shrub 2-3m x 1-2m. Masses of red flower spikes over spring and autumn. New leaves are pink. Hardy in most positions and soils. Good for hedging or screening.		Unknown
		<b><i>Callistemon pachyphyllus</i> 'Smoked Salmon'</b> Family: Myrtaceae Erect shrub 0.5-1.5m x 0.5-1.5m. Salmon pink to shell pink flowers most of year with peaks in summer and autumn-early winter. Tolerates both moist and dry conditions; prefers sandy soil.	T	
































		<b><i>Callistemon subulatus</i> 'Brogo Overflow'</b> <b>Family: Myrtaceae</b> Shrub with weeping habit to 1.5m x 1.5-2.5m. Crimson red bottlebrushes from autumn-winter to summer. Dark green leaves with reddish new growth. Most soils. Can withstand some waterlogging. Good for screening, low hedges or containers. Attracts birds, bees and other insects.		
		<b><i>Callistemon viminalis</i> 'Little John'</b> <b>Family: Myrtaceae</b> Rounded shrub 0.75-1m x 0.5-1m. Red bottlebrush flowers prolific in spring. Grey blue-green narrow dense soft foliage. Flowers best in full sun. Most soil types. Suitable for courtyards, pots and rockeries.		
		<b><i>Callistemon viminalis</i> 'Wild River'</b> <b>Family: Myrtaceae</b> Weeping shrub 3-4m x 2-3m. Masses of bright red bottlebrush flowers in spring and autumn. Light green foliage with crimson new growth. Most soils including poorly drained soils. Good feature plant; ideal for hedging or screening. Attracts birds.	T	Moderate
		<b><i>Calytrix tetragona</i></b> <b>Family: Myrtaceae</b> <i>Common name: Fringe Myrtle</i> Upright shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. White to deep pink star flowers in spring and summer. Fine bright green foliage. Well-drained soil. Prune regularly. Good feature plant and cut flower. Attracts bees and other insects.		Unknown
		<b><i>Ceratopetalum gummiferum</i></b> <b>Family: Cunoniaceae</b> <i>Common name: NSW Christmas Bush</i> Erect shrub or small tree, usually 5m x 1.5m in the ACT. Creamy-white clusters of flowers in summer then red sepals in autumn. Flowers best in full sun. Most well drained soils. Protect from hot winds. Good feature plant and cut flower. Also ideal for screening.		No
		<b><i>Chorizema cordatum</i></b> <b>Family: Fabaceae</b> <i>Common name: Heart-leaf Flame Pea or Flame Pea</i> Erect or scrambling shrub 0.3-1m x 0.5-1.5m. Vibrant orange-red and yellow flowers in spring; deeper colour when grown in shade. Leaves often heart shaped. Well drained and mulched soils. Ideal trailing through a rockery or as a understory feature plant.	T	Unknown
		<b><i>Citrus australasica</i> 'Byron Sunrise'</b> <b>Family: Rutaceae</b> Narrow upright shrub 1-2m x 0.5-1m. Pinkish buds then white flowers in October. Edible tangerine-red fruit in autumn. Thorny stems. Prefers partly shaded northern position. Protect from harsh winds and water regularly. Ideal for small garden or pot.	Protect from frost	No
		<b><i>Commersonia hermanniifolia</i></b> <b>Family: Malvaceae</b> <i>Common name: Wrinkled Kerrawan</i> Groundcover or trailing shrub 0.2-0.3m x 1-1.5m. Pink-tinged buds open to small starry white and pink flowers in spring. Deep red seed capsules. Dark green wrinkled leaves. Best in full sun as growth is sparser in shadier spots. Most soils. Ideal for rockeries.		Unknown
		<b><i>Correa alba</i></b> <b>Family: Rutaceae</b> <b>and <i>Correa alba</i> var. <i>alba</i></b> <i>Common name: Native Fuchsia, White Correa</i> Rounded shrub 1-1.5m x 1-1.5m. White star flowers in winter and other months. Glaucous grey-green leaves. Flowers best in full sun. Most well-drained soils. Resistant to salt spray. Good hedging plant. Useful in floral arrangements. Attracts birds.		
		<b><i>Correa baeuerlenii</i></b> <b>Family: Rutaceae</b> <i>Common Name: Chef's Hat Correa</i> Rounded shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Green bell-shaped flowers, mainly in autumn and winter. Glossy, dark green leaves. Likes dappled		No

		sunlight to shade. Prefers moist, well-drained soils. Water during dry spells. Attracts birds and is a good contrast plant.		
		<b>Correa calycina</b> Family: Rutaceae Common name: SA Green Correa, Hindmarsh Correa Dense shrub 1-3m x 1-2m. Green bell flowers, with corolla aging to mauve, most of the year including winter. Most soils and aspects including moist spots. Suitable for screening or hedging. Attracts birds. Rare in SA and listed as vulnerable.		Unknown
		<b>Correa decumbens</b> Family: Rutaceae Common name: Spreading Correa Groundcover 0.3-0.6m x 1.5-3m. Erect pinkish red bells with yellow-green tips mainly in winter and summer. Moist or dry well-drained soils. Ideal for borders, covering banks or feature plant. Attracts birds.		
		<b>Correa 'Dusky Bells'</b> Family: Rutaceae Compact shrub 0.5-1m x 2m. Long dusky pink bell flowers in autumn and winter. Tolerates full sun but prefers some shade. Most soils including clay soils. Long lived and attracts birds.		
		<b>Correa 'Ivory Bells'</b> Family: Rutaceae Dense shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Profuse cream bells most of the year. Hardy particularly in moist, well-drained soil in a protected spot. Tolerates full sun but prefers dappled shade. Ideal for mass planting or feature plant. Attracts honey-eating birds.		Unknown
		<b>Correa 'Lemon Twist'</b> Family: Rutaceae Dense mounding or spreading shrub 0.2m x 1-1.2m. Bell shaped lemon-cream flowers autumn-winter. Benefits from pruning after flowering. Most well-drained soils. Feature plant in low maintenance garden or container. Attracts nectar feeding birds.		
		<b>Correa 'Pink Sensation'</b> Family: Rutaceae Bushy shrub to 1m x 1m. Masses of pink star-shaped flowers autumn-winter. Suits most well-drained soils. Ideal for small gardens, shrub beds or large pots. Magnet for nectar feeding birds. [Also known as <i>Correa</i> 'Pinksensation']	Probably 	Unknown
		<b>Crowea 'Cooper's Hybrid'</b> Family: Rutaceae Dense upright shrub 1-1.5m x 1m. Deep pink star flowers mainly in autumn-winter. Glossy dark green leaves. Prefers filtered or part sun. Well-drained, mulched soil. Good feature plant or in mass plantings. Attracts insects.	T	Moderate
		<b>Crowea exalata subsp exalata</b> Family: Rutaceae Rounded shrub to 1.0m x 0.7m. Showy pink to mauve star flowers most of the year. Well-drained mulched soil. Decorative and good in pots. Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.		Unknown

		<b>Crowea 'Festival'</b> Family: Rutaceae Compact dense shrub 1-1.2m x 1m. Bright pink star flowers in late summer-winter. Aromatic foliage. Grows well in most well-drained, mulched soil. Good feature plant or cut flower.		
		<b>Crowea 'Little Rockstar'</b> Family: Rutaceae Rounded compact shrub 0.8m x 0.8m. Prolific pink star flowers during autumn-winter and bright green leaves. Prefers well-		No





























		drained soils and extra water during dry summers. Suits smaller gardens and pots. Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.		
		<b><i>Elaeocarpus reticulatus</i> 'Prima Donna'</b> <b>Family: Elaeocarpaceae</b> <i>Common name: Blueberry Ash</i> Small tree 4-8m x 1.5-3m. Masses of delicate pink fringed bell flowers in spring. Blue fruits in summer. Most well drained soils. Likes some shade but not essential. Can be pruned to shape and grown in a large pot. Good cut flower. Attracts seed eating birds.	T	No
		<b><i>Epacris impressa</i> 'Bega'</b> <b>Family: Ericaceae</b> Stiff branched shrub usually 1m x 1m. Bright red tubular flowers from autumn into spring. Best in well-drained mulched soil. Good as feature or container plant. Attracts nectar feeding birds.	T	No
		<b><i>Epacris longiflora</i> (white form)</b> <b>Family: Ericaceae</b> <i>Common name: Fuchsia Heath</i> Straggly shrub 0.5-1.3m x 1m. Narrow tubular white flowers along arching branches. Flowers most of the year with peak during summer-autumn. Best in partial shade. Needs well-drained soil; doesn't tolerate drying out. Prune to promote bushier shape. Ideal for pots or rockery. Attracts nectar feeding birds.		No
		<b><i>Epacris longiflora</i> 'Nectar Pink'</b> <b>Family: Ericaceae</b> Upright, straggly shrub 0.5-1m x 0.5-1m. Pink flowers with lighter tips, most of the year. Likes moist but well-drained, light to medium soils. Suitable for containers and rockeries. Bird attracting.		No
		<b><i>Eremophila glabra</i> 'Kalbarri Carpet'</b> <b>Family: Scrophulariaceae</b> Dense groundcover 0.1-0.2m x 1-2m. Profuse yellow tubular flowers mainly in spring and summer. Soft silvery-grey foliage. Well-drained soil, dislikes excess humidity. Tip prune to improve foliage density and flower production. Use in large containers or plant over retaining walls or banks. Attracts birds and insects.	T	
		<b><i>Eremophila nivea</i> 'Gubburra Bells'</b> <b>Family: Scrophulariaceae</b> Shrub 1-1.5m x 1-1.2m. Profuse lilac-purple tubular flowers over winter-spring. Contrasting silvery foliage and stems. Well-drained, loamy soil. Prune to encourage compact habit. Good feature plant. Attracts nectar feeding insects and birds.	T	Unknown
		<b><i>Eremophila subfloccosa</i> subsp <i>subfloccosa</i></b> <b>Family: Scrophulariaceae</b> Spreading shrub 0.5-1m x 1-2m. Yellow-green tubular flowers in spring-summer. Soft dense grey-green hairy leaves. Most reasonably drained soils. Best in open area to allow good air movement. Can be pruned lightly and grown in a container.		
		<b><i>Eremophila youngii</i></b> <b>Family: Scrophulariaceae</b> Erect shrub usually 1-2m x 0.6-1m in the ACT. Red-pink tubular flowers mainly in winter-spring. Most well-drained soils. Adaptable but prefers sunny site with air movement. Ideal in pots. Attracts birds and nectar feeding insects.		
		<b><i>Eucalyptus gregsoniana</i> [seed]</b> <b>Family: Myrtaceae</b> <i>Common name: Wolgan or Mallee Snow Gum</i> Mallee or single-stemmed tree 4-6m x 4m. Clusters of creamy white flowers in late spring-summer. Narrow glossy green leaves contrast with young burgundy-coloured stems. White or grey bark on older trees sheds in ribbons. Well drained sandy soil. May be pruned regularly to a single trunk. Good feature plant.		Unknown





		<b><i>Goodenia ovata</i></b> <b>Family: Goodeniaceae</b> <i>Common name: Hop Goodenia</i> Shrub usually 1-1.5m x 0.6-1m. Large yellow flowers mainly in spring and summer. Leaves often shiny and sticky. Suits most soils but prefers some shade. Fast growing; responds to pruning. Ideal for mass planting or in pots. Attracts butterflies and other insects.		Unknown
		<b><i>Grevillea 'Bon Accord'</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Erect shrub usually 1.5-2m x 1.5-2m. Crimson spider flowers spring-summer. Bronze new growth. Well drained soils. Best in a sunny spot but will tolerate some shade. Good feature plant or cut flower. Attracts nectar feeding birds, butterflies and other insects.		Unknown
		<b><i>Grevillea 'Bonfire'</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Open shrub 1.5-2m x 2m. Masses of bright red spider flowers in spring. Most soils. Prune to encourage dense growth. Ideal as feature plant or for screening. Attracts birds.	T	Unknown
		<b><i>Grevillea lanigera (prostrate)</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> <i>Common name: Prostrate Woolly Grevillea</i> Groundcover to 0.5m x 1-2m wide. Red and cream flowers in semi-erect clusters most of the year. Neat grey-green, "woolly" foliage. Most soils. Good container or rockery plant. Attracts birds.		
		<b><i>Grevillea leptobotrys 'Lilac Tangles'</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Sprawling shrub 0.1-0.5m x 1-2m wide. Delicate perfumed lilac-pink flowers from late spring into summer. Prickly silvery-blue-green foliage. Shelter from heavy frost. Most well-drained soils. Ideal for rockeries or in pots.	T	Unknown
		<b><i>Grevillea 'Mason's Hybrid'</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Bushy shrub 1.5-2m x 2-3m. Attractive apricot-red flowers with divided leaves, long flowering. Well-drained soil. Good low hedge or screen and feature plant. [Also known as <i>Grevillea 'Ned Kelly'</i> ]	T	
		<b><i>Grevillea 'Red Wings'</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Spreading shrub 0.3-1.5m x 1-2m. Bright red, spidery flowers late winter-spring. Small trident shaped leaves. Suited to most well-drained soils. Good cut flower. Attracts bees, butterflies and birds.	T	
		<b><i>Grevillea rhyolitica 'Deua Flame'</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Spreading shrub 1.5-2m x 1-2m. Showy red flowers mainly spring-summer. Prefers sun but will tolerate some shade. Adapted to low nutrient rocky soils. Ideal feature plant or screen. Attracts birds.		Unknown
		<b><i>Grevillea sericea subsp. sericea</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> <i>Common name: Silky Grevillea</i> Upright shrub 1-2m x 1-1.5m, may spread by suckering. Prolific pink spider flowers mainly in winter and spring. Well-drained soil. Prune for compact shape. Very attractive to bees.	T	Unknown
		<b><i>Grevillea 'Sid Reynolds'</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Dense, rounded shrub 2-2.5m x 2-2.5m. Profuse pale red, pink and yellow spider flowers in spring. Fine foliage, upper surface green, lower surface silvery. Best in sunny site with well-drained soil. Screening and feature plant. Attracts birds and insects.		Unknown
		<b><i>Grevillea x gaudichaudii</i></b> <b>Family: Proteaceae</b> Dense groundcover usually 0.1-0.3m x 3m. Deep red toothbrush flowers spring-summer. Oak like leaves. Hardy in most situations. Ideal for cascading over an embankment or retaining wall. Fast growing and attracts birds.		






