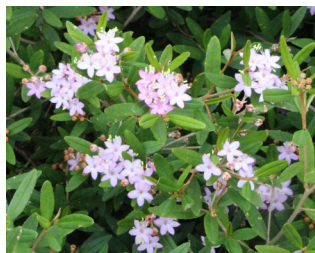


12. On your left is **Correa 'Lemon Twist'**, a hybrid between *C. reflexa* var. *nummularia* and *C. alba* which occurred in the gardens of Native Plant Wholesalers in Mount Gambier (photo below left). 'Lemon Twist' is a small, spreading shrub with attractive shiny foliage and well displayed lemon flowers.



13.. Also on your left is **Phebalium woombye**, a bushy shrub with slender leaves, silver on the reverse, and clusters of starry, pink flowers, native to the coastal regions of southeastern Queensland and northeastern NSW (photo above right).

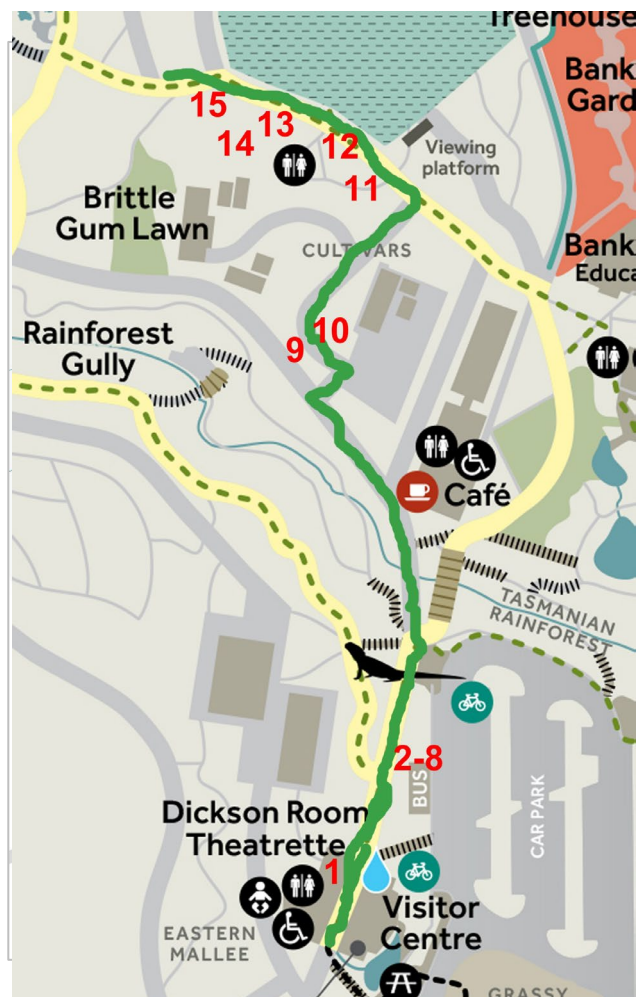
14. Behind on your left is **Banksia neoanglica**, or New England Banksia, with silver-backed, dark green foliage and gold flowers with black styles held upright. This shrub is native to the eastern tablelands of Queensland and NSW (photo below left).



15. On your left is **Correa 'Snowbelle'**, a small, spreading shrub with grey-green foliage and white bell-shaped flowers with upturned petals bred by Peter Ollerenshaw at Bywong Nursery, near Canberra (photo above right).



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Today we will walk from the Visitor Centre, up the hill behind the depot, then uphill again towards the Rock Garden



1. As you leave the Visitor Centre on your left is **Lepidozamia peroffskyana**, or Pineapple Zamia, one of the tallest cycads, with long arching stems of shiny, dark green foliage(photo above). This palm-like cycad is native to the wet open forests of southeastern Queensland and northeastern NSW. These plants do not produce flowers but have large cones on separate female and male plants.

2. On your right is **Isopogon cuneatus**, an upright shrub with floppy branches of flat, bright green leaves, often tinged with red, and large pink heads of drumstick flowers (photo next page top left). This plant is native to southwestern WA.



3. Also on your right, in a pot, is ***Lechenaultia formosa***, a small, attractive plant with close grey-green foliage and bright gold flowers (photo above right). The genus *Lechenaultia* is named after the naturalist Leschenault de la Tour, 1773-1826. This plant is native to southwestern WA.



4. Further on your right is ***Anigozanthos* 'Bush Pearl'**, a hybrid Kangaroo Paw with long-blooming, bright pink flowers developed by Angus Stewart (photo above).



5. Also on your right is ***Hakea laurina x petiolaris* 'Pin Ball'**, a tall shrub or small tree with leathery, green leaves and ball-like red flowers with creamy white styles (photo above). The flowers attract nectar feeding birds.

6. Still on your right, in a pot, is ***Templetonia retusa*** or Cockies Tongues with rounded, greyish-green leaves and red pea flowers (photo below). These plants, named after John Templeton, an 18th century botanist, are native to the coastal borders of SA and WA, also Flinders Ranges, SA.



7. On your right is ***Acacia beckleri***, or Barrier Range Wattle, with hard, elliptical grey-green foliage and yellow ball flowers on stalks (photo above). This plant is native to the Barrier Range of NSW, near Cobar and Jerilderie.



8. Also on your right is ***Grevillea* 'Peaches and Cream'** with deeply-divided green leaves and large flower heads of pink and cream (photo above). This hybrid was developed in Queensland by Jan Glazebrook and Dennis Cox and patented in 2006.

9. Bear left uphill past the café, then right behind the depot to see, on your left, ***Banksia ericifolia* 'Bird Song'**, a small hybrid banksia with fine, bright green foliage and large orange flowers (photo below).



10. On your right is ***Scaevola* 'Pink Fusion'**, a low-growing, wide-spreading, cushion-like plant with many pink, fan flowers over a long period (photo below).



11. As you turn left uphill notice on your left ***Grevillea* 'Legacy Flame'**, a small grevillea, bred locally by Bywong Nursery, which commemorates 100 years of Legacy Australia with flame-like orange-red flowers which resemble the Legacy torch.
