

12. Also on your left is ***Callistemon subulatus*** 'Brogo Overflow' with bright red flowers and a low spreading habit (photo below left). This species is native to NSW and Victoria where it grows along the banks of watercourses. Bear right along the road with the Ian Potter Conservatory site.



13. On your right is ***Banksia pencillata*** or Newnes Plateau Banksia, a small tree covered in whorled, olive- green foliage and greenish-yellow flowers (photo above right). This plant is native to a restricted area of the Blue Mountains, NSW.

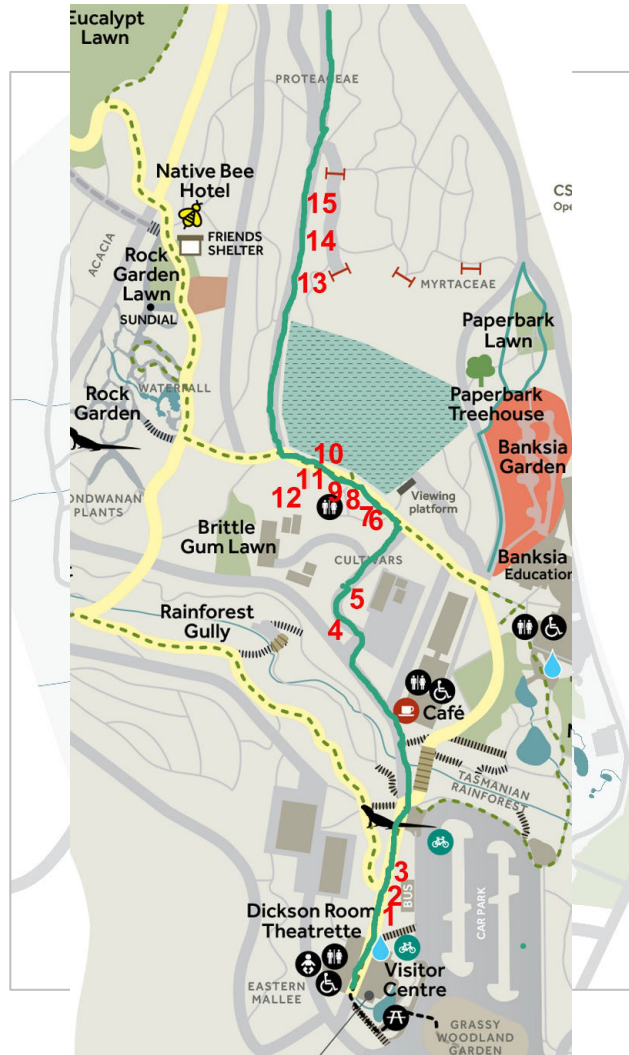
14. Also on your right is ***Isopogon cuneatus***, an upright shrub with floppy branches of flat bright green leaves, often tinged with red, and large pink heads of drumstick flowers (photo below left). This plant is native to southwestern WA.



15. Again on your right is ***Banksia neoanglica***, or New England Banksia, with silver-backed, green foliage and gold flowers with dark-red styles held upright (photo above right). This shrub is native to the eastern tablelands of Queensland and NSW.



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Today we will walk up the hill behind the café and along the road past the Ian Potter Conservatory construction site



1. After you leave the Visitor Centre on your right, in a pot, is ***Pimelea physodes***, or Qualup Bell, with grey-green foliage close to reddish stems with pendant green bracts enclosing the small flowers and dark red outer bracts (photo above). This plant is native to southwestern WA and is considered the most outstanding of the genus.

2. Also on your right is ***Anigozanthos*** 'Bush Pearl', a hybrid Kangaroo Paw with long-blooming, bright pink flowers developed by Angus Stewart (photo next page top left).



3. Again on your right is ***Chorizema cordatum*** or Heart-leaved Flame Pea, a showy plant with vivid pink and orange flowers on a weeping shrub with bright-green prickly foliage, native to the moist southwestern parts of WA (photo above right).



4. Bear left behind the café and right behind the depot to see, on your left ***Banksia ericifolia*** 'Bird Song', a small hybrid banksia with fine, bright green foliage and large orange flowers (photo above).



5. On your right is ***Banksia spinulosa***, a bush with large pale-yellow flowers held upright on toothed linear grey-green foliage (photo above). Sometimes known as the Hairpin Banksia, this plant is native to the three eastern states extending along the coast from Victoria to Cairns.

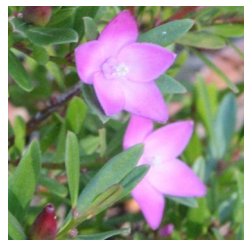
6. As you turn left uphill, on your left is ***Grevillea*** 'Legacy Flame', a small grevillea, bred locally by Bywong Nursery, which commemorates 100 years of Legacy Australia with flame-like, orange-red flowers which resemble the Legacy torch (photo below).



7. Also on your left is ***Westringia fruticosa*** 'Wunderbar' or 'Double Wonder', a small dense shrub with grey-green foliage and pale mauve or pink semi-double flowers (photo below).



8. Still on your left is ***Crowea*** 'Little Rockstar', a compact form of *Crowea*, reaching only 60-80cm high, from a seedling variant growing at the ANBG. This plant has many pink star flowers (photo below)..



9. Again on your left is ***Grevillea*** 'Bloodline', bred at Bywong Nursery by Peter Ollerenshaw, similar to the long flowering variety *Grevillea* 'Lady O', but with a slightly arching habit (photo below).



10. On your right is ***Brachychiton rupestris***, or Queensland Bottle Tree, a small tree with a trunk swollen with water, endemic to central Queensland and northern NSW (photo below).



11. On your left is ***Phebalium woombye***, a bushy shrub with slender leaves, silver on the reverse, and clusters of starry, pink flowers, native to the coastal regions of southeastern Queensland and northeastern NSW (photo below).
