		<i>Acacia cardiophylla</i> 'Gold Lace' Family: Fabaceae Dense groundcover 0.2m x 1-2m. Perfumed yellow-gold ball flowers in spring. Feathery grey-green foliage. Most soils with reasonable drainage. Ideal for cascading over walls, slopes or a large pot.	T	
		<i>Acacia floribunda</i> [seed] Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Gossamer Wattle</i> Graceful, dense tree 6-8m x 2m plus. Scented cream rods in early spring. Well-drained soils. Prune to hedge or screen. Fast growing. Grows well in coastal conditions.		
		<i>Acacia leprosa</i> 'Scarlet Blaze' Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Cinnamon Wattle</i> Large weeping shrub 4-5m x 2-2.5m. Unusual red ball flowers in spring. Crushed leaves smell of cinnamon. Most well-drained soils. Dislikes summer humidity. Trim after flowering. Good feature plant or soft screen. Attracts bees, birds and butterflies.	T	
		<i>Acacia pravissima</i> 'Kuranga Cascade' Family: Fabaceae Weeping or prostrate shrub 1m x 3m. Triangular grey-green foliage and masses of golden ball flowers in spring. Fast growing. Ideal for cascading over an embankment or retaining wall.	T	Unknown
		<i>Anigozanthus flavidus</i> [seed] (red form and red-orange form)) Family: Haemodoraceae <i>Common name: Tall Kangaroo Paw</i> Clumping plant with strappy dark green leaves to 1m x 1-2m. Red	T	
































		<i>Babingtonia pluriflora</i> 'White Cascade' Family: Myrtaceae Spreading shrub to 0.5m x 1.5m. Clusters of small white flowers in autumn and summer. Attractive coppery new growth. Most soils. Prune after flowering. Good feature or screening plant. Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.		
		<i>Babingtonia similis</i> 'Howie's Feathertips' Family: Myrtaceae Weeping shrub up to 0.5m x 1.0m. Small clusters of brilliant white flowers in spring-summer. Adaptable plant but grows best in moist, well-drained sunny spot. Ideal for growing over rock walls or ledges. Attracts birds and insects. [Also called <i>Baেকেea</i> or <i>Sannantha</i> 'Howie's Feathertips'.]	T	Unknown
		<i>Baেকেea gunniana</i> Family: Myrtaceae Common name: Alpine Baেকেea Variable shrub usually 0.3-1m x 0.3-1m but may reach 1.5-2m high. Masses of small white flowers in summer. Needs regular watering. Tolerates wet ground; leaves have pleasant tea tree smell when crushed. ACT plant.		No
		<i>Baেকেea linifolia</i> Family: Myrtaceae Common name: Weeping Baেকেea Weeping shrub to 2.5m x 2m. Tiny white flowers most of the year; but particularly around summer. Adapts to most situations, more compact in full sun. Good in damp spots. Prune regularly for bushy shape. Good feature plant.		No
		<i>Banksia ericifolia</i> 'Bird Song' Family: Proteaceae Dense shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Cylindrical flowers, starting yellow and aging to dark red-orange, in autumn-winter. Shiny green foliage. Full sun for best flowering. Well-drained soil. In heavier soils consider raised beds or pots. Ideal for hedging, as feature or massed planting. Attracts birds and other wildlife.	T	Unknown
		<i>Banksia neoanglica</i> Family: Proteaceae Common name: New England Banksia Multi-stemmed shrub usually 2.5-3m high. Some forms grow to 7m. Orange to yellow-orange flower spikes mainly autumn-winter. Well-drained sandy to loam soil. Slow growing. Suitable for hedging or screening. Attracts nectar feeding birds.		Unknown
		<i>Banksia oblongifolia</i> Family: Proteaceae Common name: Fern-leaved, Dwarf or Rusty Banksia Open, multi-stemmed shrub to 2m x 2m. Yellow-green flowers in autumn and winter. New leaves covered with rusty fur. Prefers well-drained soil. Needs pruning. May need extra water in dry weather; tolerant to salt spray. Bird attracting.		No
		<i>Banksia serrata</i> 'Pygmy Possum' Family: Proteaceae Mound-shaped groundcover with arching branches 0.3-0.6m x 1-2.5m. Yellow/cream flowers over many months. Best in full sun but will tolerate some shade. Well-drained soil preferred. Suitable for coastal areas and bonsai.		
		<i>Banksia spinulosa</i> 'Birthday Candles' Family: Proteaceae Cushion shaped groundcover 0.5-0.6m x 0.5-1.2m. Short orange spikes with reddish styles from autumn to early spring. Full sun results in better flowering. Likes well-drained soil. Ideal for rockery or container. Suits coastal areas as tolerates salt laden winds. Attracts wildlife		Unknown






























		<i>Banksia spinulosa</i> 'Coastal Cushion' Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Hairpin Banksia</i> Groundcover 0.5-1m x 0.5-1.2m. Golden flower spikes with maroon stamens through autumn into spring. Full sun results in better flowering. Adapts to most soil types. Fast growing. Useful as feature or container plant. Very attractive to birds.		Unknown
		<i>Banksia spinulosa</i> 'Honeypots' Family: Proteaceae Broad-domed groundcover 1m x 1.5m. Golden flower spikes in autumn and winter. Dense foliage. Well-drained soil. Suitable for rockeries or containers. Attracts wildlife.		No
		<i>Bauera rubioides</i> Family: Cunoniaceae <i>Common name: River Rose, Dog Rose</i> Scrambling shrub 1-1.5m x 1-2m. Small cup shaped pink flowers most of the year. Needs moist well-drained soil. Mulch well. Good understorey plant, as low hedge or in pots. Attracts bees and butterflies.		No
		<i>Boronia megastigma</i> 'Purple Jared' Family: Rutaceae Dense shrub to 0.7-1.5m x 1-1.2m. Perfumed deep purple flowers over winter-spring. Prefers a cool root run so mulch well or use rocks. Most soils. Ideal in courtyards or containers. Good cut flower. Attracts butterflies and other insects.	T	Unknown
		<i>Boronia</i> 'Telopea Valley Star' Family: Rutaceae Erect shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Profuse deep pink star shaped flowers mainly in spring. Likes dappled shade with protection from hot winds and afternoon sun. Most well-drained soils. Prune after flowering. Ideal feature plant in garden or pot.		Unknown
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> (white form) Family: Asteraceae <i>Common name: Cut-leaf Daisy</i> Dense perennial herb to 0.15m x 0.60m. White daisy flowers most of year but best in spring and summer. Prefers full sun, will tolerate some shade. Suits most well-drained soils. Prune old flowers for continuous display. Ideal for baskets, borders or mass plantings.		No
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Breakoday' Family: Asteraceae Compact perennial herb 0.2-0.4m x 0.4-0.8m. Deep mauve daisy flowers with gold centres most of the year but best in spring and summer. Adequate moisture needed for maximum flowering. Suits baskets, rockery or pots.		No
		<i>Brachyscome multifida</i> 'Roulette' Family: Asteraceae Prostrate bushy perennial herb 0.1-0.4m x 0.2-1m. Blue-mauve flowers with yellow centres most of the year, best in spring and summer. Spreads by branching and underground suckers.		Unknown
		<i>Brachyscome</i> 'Strawberry Mousse' Family: Asteraceae Groundcover 0.15m x 1m. Bright pink daisy flowers with gold centres, from spring through to autumn. Hardy in most soils with good drainage. Suitable for containers, hanging baskets, rockeries.	T	
		<i>Callistemon</i> 'Bootie Bootie Queen' Family: Myrtaceae Rounded shrub to 1.5m x 1.5-2m. Large dark red flowers mainly in spring-summer. Most soils including poorly drained soils. Good feature plant. Attracts birds.	T	Unknown
		<i>Callistemon</i> 'Hannah's Child' Family: Myrtaceae Slightly weeping shrub 2-4 m x 1-2m. Profuse scarlet flowers mainly in autumn and spring. Tolerates heavy wet soils. Ideal for hedging or screening. Attracts birds.	T	


































		Callistemon montanus Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Mountain Bottlebrush</i> Erect or spreading shrub 2-3m x 1-2m. Masses of red flower spikes over spring and autumn. New leaves are pink. Hardy in most positions and soils. Good for hedging or screening.		Unknown
		Callistemon subulatus 'Brogo Overflow' Family: Myrtaceae Shrub with weeping habit to 1.5m x 1.5-2.5m. Crimson red bottlebrushes from autumn-winter to summer. Dark green leaves with reddish new growth. Most soils. Can withstand some waterlogging. Good for screening, low hedges or containers.		
		Calothamnus quadrifidus Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: One sided Bottlebrush</i> Erect or spreading shrub usually to 2.5m x 2.5m. Feathery red flowers in spring-summer. Neat green-grey needle-like leaves. Adapts to wide range of growing conditions. Good feature plant and for screening. Attracts birds.		
		Calytrix leschenaultii Family: Myrtaceae <i>Common name: Posy Starflower</i> Erect shrub usually 0.15-1 m x 1m. Vivid mauve-purple star flowers, with creamy-yellow stamens aging to red, over late spring-summer. Tiny scented leaves. Light to medium well-drained soil. Ideal for pots and small gardens.	T	
		Chrysocephalum apiculatum Family: Asteracea <i>Common name: Yellow Buttons</i> Suckering perennial herb 0.15-0.4m x 0.5-2m. Clusters of small golden flowers during warmer months. Variable green or silver leaves. Most soils. Good for massed planting on banks. Prune at end of winter to encourage denser growth. ACT plant.		Unknown
		Citrus australasica 'Byron Sunrise' Family: Rutaceae Narrow upright shrub 1-2m x 0.5-1m. Pinkish buds then white flowers in October. Edible tangerine-red fruit in autumn. Thorny stems. Prefers partly shaded northern position. Protect from harsh winds and water regularly. Ideal for small garden or pot.	Protect from frost	No
		Correa alba Family: Rutaceae <i>Common name: Native Fuchsia, White Correa</i> Rounded shrub 1-1.5m x 1-1.5m. White star flowers in winter and other months. Glaucous grey-green leaves. Flowers best in full sun. Most well-drained soils. Resistant to salt spray. Good hedging plant. Useful in floral arrangements. Attracts birds.		
		Correa alba (prostrate form) Family: Rutaceae <i>Common name: Native Fuchsia, White Correa</i> Low shrub 0.3-0.4m x 1-1.2m. White star flowers mainly in winter. Prune to keep dense. Well-drained soil. Tolerates salt spray. Ideal for mass planting, rockeries or in a pot. Attracts insects and birds.		
		Correa baeuerlenii Family: Rutaceae <i>Common Name: Chef's Hat Correa</i> Rounded shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Green bell-shaped flowers, mainly in autumn and winter. Glossy, dark green leaves. Likes dappled sunlight to shade. Prefers moist, well-drained soils. Water during dry spells. Attracts birds and is a good contrast plant.		No
		Correa 'Cane's Hybrid' Family: Rutaceae Low spreading shrub 0.6-1m x 1m. Large pale pink/cream tubular flowers with pale green tips in winter. Hairy leaves. Suits most soils with reasonable drainage. Protect root zone from hot sun. Good for small gardens and pots.		Unknown





























		Correa 'Dusky Bells' Family: Rutaceae Compact shrub 0.5-1m x 2m. Long dusky pink bell flowers in autumn and winter. Tolerates full sun but prefers some shade. Most soils including clay soils. Long lived and attracts birds.		
		Correa glabra var. glabra Family: Rutaceae Rounded or erect shrub 2-3m x 1-3m. Pale yellow-green tubular flowers mainly autumn-winter. Little information about this variety but it is likely to have similar growing needs to Correa glabra. Can be used for screening. Attract birds.		Unknown
		Correa 'Ivory Bells' Family: Rutaceae Dense shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Profuse cream bells most of the year. Hardy particularly in moist, well-drained soil in a protected spot. Tolerates full sun but prefers dappled shade. Ideal for mass planting or feature plant. Attracts honey-eating birds.		Unknown
		Correa 'Lemon Twist' Family: Rutaceae Dense mounding or spreading shrub 0.2m x 1-1.2m. Bell shaped lemon-cream flowers autumn-winter. Benefits from pruning after flowering. Most well-drained soils. Feature plant in low maintenance garden or container. Attracts nectar feeding birds.		
		Correa 'Marian's Marvel' Family: Rutaceae Open hardy shrub 1-2m x 3m. Flowers pale pink upper, lime green tips in autumn and winter. Requires extra water in extended dry periods. Suitable as a hedge or container plant. Bird attracting.		No
		Correa 'Pink Sensation' Family: Rutaceae Bushy shrub to 1m x 1m. Masses of pink star-shaped flowers autumn-winter. Suits most well-drained soils. Ideal for small gardens, shrub beds or large pots. Magnet for nectar feeding birds. [Also known as <i>Correa</i> 'Pinksensation']	Probably 	Unknown
		Correa pulchella Family: Rutaceae Prostrate or erect shrub 0.2-1m x 1-2m. Pink, orange-pink or red-pink bells through autumn and spring. Prune for vigorous growth and good flower production. Mulch well and water deeply in extended dry periods. Good container plant; bird attracting.		No
		Crowea exalata Family: Rutaceae Rounded shrub 0.7m x 0.7m. Profuse waxy pink star flowers most of the year, particularly in autumn and spring. Well-drained mulched soil. Benefits from pruning. Supplement water in dry periods. Very decorative; good in pots or rockeries. ACT plant.		No
		Crowea exalata subsp exalata Family: Rutaceae Rounded shrub to 1.0m x 0.7m. Showy pink to mauve star flowers most of the year. Well-drained mulched soil. Decorative and good in pots. Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.		Unknown
		Crowea 'Festival' Family: Rutaceae Compact dense shrub 1-1.2m x 1m. Bright pink star flowers in late summer-winter. Aromatic foliage. Grows well in most well-drained, mulched soil. Good feature plant or cut flower.		
		Crowea 'Little Rockstar' Family: Rutaceae Rounded compact shrub 0.8m x 0.8m. Prolific pink star flowers during autumn-winter and bright green leaves. Prefers well-drained soils and extra water during dry summers. Suits smaller gardens and pots. Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.		No




























		<i>Cymbopogon refractus</i> [seed] Family: Poaceae <i>Common name: Barbed Wire Grass</i> Tufted perennial grass to 0.4 m high with flower spikes 1-1.5m. Green flowers with red-brown markings from spring to autumn. Seedheads resemble barb wire when mature. Crushed foliage has lemony scent. Good for dry sites or low nutrient soils. ACT plant.		
		<i>Epacris impressa</i> 'Bega' Family: Ericaceae Stiff branched shrub usually 1m x 1m. Bright red tubular flowers from autumn into spring. Best in well-drained mulched soil. Good as feature or container plant. Attracts nectar feeding birds.	T	No
		<i>Epacris longiflora</i> Family: Ericaceae <i>Common name: Fuchsia Heath</i> Straggly shrub 0.5-1.3m x 1m. Tubular white flowers along arching branches. Flowers most of the year, peaking summer-autumn. Best in partial shade. Needs well drained soil; doesn't tolerate drying out. Ideal for pots or rockery. Attracts nectar feeding birds.		No
		<i>Epacris longiflora</i> 'Nectar Pink' Family: Ericaceae Upright, straggly shrub 0.5-1m x 0.5-1m. Pink flowers with lighter tips, most of the year. Likes moist but well-drained, light to medium soils. Suitable for containers and rockeries. Bird attracting.		No
		<i>Eremophila nivea</i> 'Gubburra Bells' Family: Scrophulariaceae Shrub 1-1.5m x 1-1.2m. Profuse lilac-purple tubular flowers over winter-spring. Contrasting silvery foliage and stems. Well-drained, loamy soil. Prune to encourage compact habit. Good feature plant. Attracts nectar feeding insects and birds.	T	Unknown
		<i>Eremophila youngii</i> Family: Scrophulariaceae Erect shrub usually 1-2m x 0.5-1m. Pinkish-red tubular flowers most of the year, particularly over winter-spring. Most well-drained soils. Prefers sunny site with air movement. Ideal in pots. Attracts birds and nectar feeding insects.		
		<i>Goodenia ovata</i> Family: Goodeniaceae <i>Common name: Hop Goodenia</i> Shrub usually 1-1.5m x 0.6-1m. Large yellow flowers mainly in spring and summer. Leaves often shiny and sticky. Suits most soils but prefers some shade. Fast growing; responds to pruning. Ideal for mass planting or in pots. Attracts butterflies and other insects.		Unknown
		<i>Grevillea</i> 'Bon Accord' Family: Proteaceae Erect shrub often to 3-4 m x 2m. Crimson spider flowers spring-summer. Bronze new growth. Well-drained soils. Best in a sunny spot but will tolerate some shade. Good feature plant or cut flower. Attracts nectar feeding birds, butterflies and other insects.		Unknown
		<i>Grevillea diminuta</i> Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Brindabella Grevillea</i> Spreading shrub to 1m x 1-3m. Striking pendulous clusters of rusty-red flowers outside and bright pink inside usually in spring. Most well-drained soils. Tolerates shaded position. Very hardy. Considered rare. Suits rockery. Attracts birds. ACT plant.		
		<i>Grevillea lanigera</i> (prostrate) Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Prostrate Woolly Grevillea</i> Groundcover to 0.5m x 1-2m wide. Red and cream flowers in semi-erect clusters most of the year. Neat grey-green, "woolly" foliage. Most soils. Good container or rockery plant. Bird attracting.		
		<i>Grevillea</i> 'Poorinda Ben' Family: Proteaceae Upright shrub to 3m x 2m. Red toothbrush type flowers spring-summer. Adapts to a wide range of soil types. Use as a feature		Unknown






























		<i>Grevillea 'Poorinda Constance'</i> Family: Proteaceae Bushy shrub 3-4m x 3-5m. Bright red spider type flowers from autumn into summer. Best in a sunny spot but tolerates some shade. Most soil types including slightly alkaline. Use as a feature plant, mass planting or mixed in a shrubbery. Attracts nectar feeding birds.	T	Unknown
		<i>Grevillea 'Poorinda Royal Mantle'</i> Family: Proteaceae Groundcover 3-6m wide. Profuse magenta-red toothbrush flowers most of the year. New growth coppery-red. Best in sunny spot but tolerates some shade. Most well-drained soils. Vigorous groundcover, ideal for banks. Attracts bees and birds.		Unknown
		<i>Grevillea 'Red Wings'</i> Family: Proteaceae Spreading shrub 0.3-1m x 1-2m. Bright red, spidery flowers late winter-spring. Tiny, fine ferny leaves. Suited to most well-drained soils. Good cut flower. Attracts bees, butterflies and birds.		
		<i>Grevillea rhyolitica 'Deua Flame'</i> Family: Proteaceae Spreading shrub 1.5-2m x 1.5-2m. Showy red flowers most of the year. Prefers sun but will tolerate some shade. Adapted to low nutrient rocky soils. Ideal feature plant or screen. Attracts wildlife.		
		<i>Grevillea rosmarinifolia 'Marion'</i> Family: Proteaceae Little is written about this cultivar. The plant in the ANBG is about 0.9m x-1.5m, has reddish-pink and white spider flowers and its leaves are not prickly. <i>Grevillea rosmarinifolia</i> is a very hardy variable shrub which flowers in winter, and grows in most soils and positions. Ideal for screening or hedging. Attracts birds.	T	Unknown
		<i>Grevillea sericea subsp. sericea</i> Family Proteaceae <i>Common name: Silky Grevillea</i> Upright shrub 1-2m x 1-1.5m, may spread by suckering. Prolific pink spider flowers mainly in winter and spring. Well-drained soil. Prune for compact shape. Very attractive to bees.	T	Unknown
		<i>Grevillea x gaudichaudii</i> Family: Proteaceae Dense groundcover usually 0.1-0.3m x 3m. Deep red toothbrush flowers spring-summer. Oak like leaves. Hardy in most situations. Ideal for cascading over an embankment or retaining wall. Fast growing and attracts birds.		
		<i>Guichenotia ledifolia</i> Family: Malvaceae Spreading shrub 0.4-1.5m x 1-1.5m. Dainty mauve-pink flowers appear in sprays over midwinter and spring. Well-drained soil. Prune after flowering to create dense habit. Feature plant or low screen. Attracts bees and other insects.	T	
		<i>Hakea bakeriana [seed]</i> Family: Proteaceae Compact shrub 1-2m x 1-2m. Pale pink to crimson flowers in large clusters winter-spring. Large attractive woody fruits. Best in open sunny site. Likes sandy well drained soils but tolerates heavier soils. Provides shelter and nectar for birds.		Unknown
		<i>Hakea 'Burrendong Beauty'</i> Family: Proteaceae Sprawling shrub 0.5-1.5m x 1.5-3m. Showy pinkish-red and cream clusters of flowers-in winter-spring. Needs good drainage. Likes good air flow. Prune hard to create good shape. Good feature plant and bird attracting.		
















		<i>Hakea francisiana</i> [seed] Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Pink Spike Hakea, Bottlebrush Hakea, Emu Tree</i> Erect shrub usually 3-4m x 2m. Showy pinkish- red flowers spikes winter-spring. Most well-drained soils. Best in open sunny position but will tolerate some shade. Ideal for screening or windbreak. Attracts birds, bees and other insects		
		<i>Hakea petiolaris subsp trichophylla</i> [seed] Family: Proteaceae <i>Common name: Sea urchin Hakea</i> Shrub or small tree 3-9m high. Globular shaped cream flowers in autumn-winter which darken to mauve and then maroon. Best in open sunny position. Well drained soil, preferably acidic. Good feature plant. Attracts honey eating birds.		Unknown
Climber		<i>Hardenbergia comptoniana</i> Family: Fabaceae <i>Common name: Native Wisteria</i> Twining climber to 3m. Clusters of purple-blue pea flowers in winter-spring. Glossy dark green leaves. Most well-drained soils. Ideal for covering banks, trellis or fences. Fast growing. Attracts butterflies.	T	Unknown
		<i>Hibbertia empetrifolia</i> Family: Dilleniaceae <i>Common name: Trailing Guinea Flower</i> Groundcover 0.3- 0.6m x 1.5m. Bright yellow flowers in spring which contrast with the shiny dark green leaves. Prefers moist situation. Mass plant or use in hanging basket.	T	No
		<i>Hibbertia pedunculata</i> Family: Dilleniaceae Groundcover to around 0.6m wide, tends to spread by self-layering. Profuse bright yellow flowers mainly late spring-summer. Dislikes drying out but also doesn't like wet soil. Hardy and good weed suppressant on banks etc.		No
		<i>Howittia trilocularis</i> Family: Malvaceae <i>Common name: Blue Howittia</i> Erect shrub to 1.5-3m x 1.5-2.5m. Hibiscus-like lavender, violet or mauve flowers late spring-summer. Best in moist shady spots with good drainage, otherwise flowers less and becomes sparse. Attracts butterflies and moths.		No
